AN ATTRACTIVE C. N. R. EXHIBIT

Across Canada Via the National Was Theme of Notable Display at St. John's Big Show.

Across Canada, via the "National way," is the theme of a very attractive exhibit of the Canadian National Railways. It represents travel—and travel along the lines of the Canadian National Railways, traversing Canada from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and passing here and there to admire scenes that charm the eye and attract the attention. Eleven years ago the Intercolonial Railway had an exhibit in St. John, but now we have the Canadian National with its rail services of the finest and most modern—a Transcontinental highway from the Atlantic to the Pacific—a National line—owned and operated by the government of Canada—for the benefit of the Canadian people. The very attractive display of colored film photos gives some idea of the variety of the varied scenery of this great dominion. Finely arranged in a series of cedar bark panelling, the views are enhanced by a system of interior lighting that beautifies and attracts. There are seashore views, pastoral valleys, lakes and rivers, mountains, great cities, hunting and fishing scenes, farms and gardens, terminal docks and elevators. The construction of the exhibit compels attention. It is novel as well as artistic. The cedar bark panelling is a

WORKMAN FALLS FROM DERRICK AND BREAKS HIS LEG
True, N. B., Sept. 8—Joseph Mossey, of True, aged about thirty-five and married, fell from the third floor of the addition to the main building of Stanfield, Ltd., this afternoon, breaking one leg and losing his chin and the lower part of his face. He was taken to the Colchester hospital. The unfortunate man was one of those employed in constructing the new addition. He was working on a derrick, lifting a large timber, when the back guy broke and, slipping over, threw him off his balance. He fell thirty-two feet. Three feet from the ground he went through an open space in the planking, striking one leg and his chin against an end of a plank.

Financial District Methodist Meeting Held in Sackville

Sackville, Sept. 8.—The financial district meeting of the Sackville district of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island conference of the Methodist church was held here yesterday afternoon. The chairman of the district, Prof. W. G. Watson, of Sackville, presided and Rev. G. W. Glendinning, the financial secretary, took the minutes. There were present besides those already mentioned: Rev. Messrs. J. F. Rowley, Point de Bute; A. F. Chapman, McColly, C. Stewart, Moncton; Dr. Seccord and Mrs. Humphrey, Sackville; Rev. J. A. Ives, who is supplying at Shediac, was made a corresponding member of the district. The condition of the missions of the district was considered and grants were recommended. The chairman of the district gave a report of the general missionary fund, showing that despite the general economic depression the church had contributed last year \$1,083.00, an increase of \$847 over the previous year. The church is carrying on home mission work in Canada and Newfoundland and foreign mission work in China and Japan. The Japanese work has been carried on for fifty years and the Chinese for thirty years. An important mission is also being carried on among the aliens in Canada. The other funds of the church were considered and the assessment and allocations were adopted by the district. Rev. H. S. Strothard, Sackville, was appointed statistical secretary. A committee was appointed to arrange a programme on the state of the work for the November district meeting.

Urging greater protection for sockeye salmon, Hon. Mr. Sloan said: "Owing to reduced runs to our northern waters during the last two years, the fishermen have earned little, if anything, more than their living expenses. No other conclusion can be drawn from a study of conditions, past and present, in our northern salmon waters than that an alarming reduction has taken place in the number of fish seeking the spawning areas and consequently the runs will be destroyed unless the salmon are given much greater protection than has been afforded them in recent years."

U. S. CROPS

Washington, Sept. 9.—This year's important farm crops in the United States were forecast yesterday by the department of agriculture basing its estimate on September 1 crop conditions, as follows (expressed in millions of bushels): Spring wheat, 277; all wheat, 818; corn, 2,975; barley, 194; buckwheat, 13.5; white potatoes, 438; sweet potatoes, 108; tobacco (pounds) 1,383; flax, 11.7.

JOE WALL ON REPORT OF UNION AMALGAMATION

Montreal, Sept. 8.—Internationally organized railway-clerks, freight handlers and station employes form but a corporate guard of those organized under the Canadian Brotherhood, said Joe Wall, general organizer for the province of Quebec for the latter organization here yesterday. The comment followed publication of a report from Cincinnati, that a conference is to be held here soon to amalgamate the two organizations. According to Wall, the Canadian Brotherhood has a membership of 20,000. The president is A. R. Mosher of Ottawa.
