Discussion of the programme the city will adopt with reference to paving some of the principal streets which need it this summer occupied most of the time of a short meeting of the Common Council in committee this morning. The Mayor read a letter from C. B. Allan, secretary of the N. B. Tourist and Resources Association, regarding the visit of the Canadian Weekly Newspaper Association. The delegates will arrive on June 16 by the C. P. R. The matter was left in the hands of the Mayor.

Commissioner Frink said he had a request from J. M. Journeay regarding the moving of an electric sign from a place in Union street to another location at the corner of Union and Dorchester streets. ceived many applications for street paving. One of the most pressing of these was paving of Brittain street from Reed's Point to Charlotte street, and thence to Broad street. There was very heavy traffic here from many industries.

The commissioner, in answer to a question, said Waterloo street would come under the light paving class. The curb had been set and paid for and repairs to the sidewalk would be effected. 
