ALL UNITE FOR VISITATION
 One of Biggest Things St. John Has Known.
 Every Home to be Called Upon Friday Afternoon—Protestants, Catholics and Jews Co-operate for Great Effort.

The organization for the St. John home visitation is complete. Protestants, Catholics and Jews are co-operating in this great general betterment movement, and the educational, social, commercial, industrial and civic organizations have united with the religious bodies to further this work, as has been true in all the cities of Canada, the United States and England, where the work has been done. L. W. Simms, president of the T. S. Simms Company, Ltd., is general chairman, Dr. W. P. Broderick and Max Marcus are the vice-chairmen. A meeting of the entire committee is being held this afternoon in the home visitation headquarters in the St. John Board of Trade rooms. The plan has the hearty support of all faiths. Protestant pastors of all denominations have given the work their hearty co-operation. When the plan was presented to local Catholic pastors and the Knights of Columbus, they were much interested in it, and got in touch with Rt. Rev. Bishop LeBlanc by telegram, as he is out of the city in his work, and from Toronto he wired his hearty approval. The Jewish leaders have given the work their endorsement also, and the co-operation of all faiths is complete.

The purpose of the movement is to visit every home, give printed invitations to all the people, inviting them to attend the Sunday school, church or synagogue of their choice, and to secure records of the church connection or preference of every individual, which will be given to the pastor, priest, rabbi or organization preferred. It is promoted by the St. John County and Maritime Religious Education Council and International Sunday School Association, under the auspices of the Protestant, Catholic and Jewish Sunday schools, churches and synagogues, ministers, Evangelical Alliance, Catholic clergy, Jewish rabbis, Young Men's Christian Association, Knights of Columbus, Young Men's Hebrew Association, Young Women's Christian Association, Catholic Women's Societies, Jewish Women's Societies, Young People's Societies, Salvation Army, Missions, the Rotary Club, educational, social, commercial, industrial, civic organization, etc., etc.

C. P. R. INSPECTION

 A high mass of requiem was celebrated in the Cathedral this morning at seven o'clock for the repose of the soul of Walter Francis Dillon, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Dillon, 219 Waterloo street, who was killed in action "somewhere in France" on September 30, 1918.

THE MARSH ROAD.
 In the report of the paving operations on the Marsh road which appeared this morning, it was stated that there would be a gap of about 100 feet between the city line and the start of the government road. In reference to this matter, H. S. Carter said this morning that Premier Foster had taken the matter up with Commissioner Frink, with a view to having the city road completed to the government stretch, thus eliminating the "no man land." Mr. Carter said that the Public Works Department is anxious to have the work completed.

FREE NIGHT SCHOOLS
 They Will Open Next Week for the Winter Season.

The free night schools for boys and men will open on Monday evening at seven o'clock in the King Edward school, corner of St. James and Wentworth streets, and in the Albert school, West St. John.
 Reading, writing, spelling and arithmetic will be taught. A registration fee of \$2.00 (two dollars) will be collected from each pupil upon enrollment. This, however, is returnable on the basis of attendance.
 The local school board is to be commended for providing these schools where free instruction may be obtained. They afford an excellent opportunity to ambitious boys and men who are desirous of improving their education. Those who have never attended school will be taught to read, write, spell and will be given instruction in arithmetic.
 Rex R. Cormier will have charge of the classes that attend in the King Edward school.
 For further information prospective pupils may apply at either of the above mentioned schools next Monday evening between the hours of seven and nine.

PRIZES FOR ESSAY ON NAVY LEAGUE
 The New Brunswick division of the Navy League of Canada have offered a prize for the best school essay on the subject, "Why Should Canada Support the Navy League?" This competition is open to any pupil under sixteen years of age in the superior or high schools of New Brunswick. The essay must be of at least 300 words and not more than 1,000 words. The essays will be judged by a committee appointed by the Dominion Council of the Navy League. The sum of \$25 will be given to the pupil submitting the best essay and \$25 to the principal of the school of which the successful competitor is a pupil. The competition will open at once and close on December 1. Letters and circulars have been sent out to 50 principals in the province. The essays are to be forwarded to the divisional headquarters in St. John, and then they will all be sent to the judges.

PROBATE COURT
 In the probate court the last will of Thomas Allan Bustin was proved, and his son, E. Bustin, sworn as executor. He left \$1,600 real and \$1,300 personal property, divided among the members of his family. S. W. Palmer was proctor. He, with Mrs. Sadie Cunningham, and in the matter of the estate of the late Mr. McNeely left more than \$1,500, which was given as the value of the estate, but that it had not been possible to ascertain how much. G. E. Logan was proctor. R. S. Wilson and A. H. Wilson were appointed administrators of the estate of Thomas Henry Wilson, realty \$850, and personally \$19,660. W. H. Harrison was proctor.
