WAYAGAMACK PULP & PAPER  
CO., LTD., FULL CAPA-  
CITY, NOW TURNING OUT 240  
TONS OF PULP AND 100 TONS  
OF PAPER DAILY.

Three Rivers, March 13.—Increased ac-  
tivity has been in evidence in the pulp  
and paper district recently. It is an-  
nounced that the Wayagamek Pulp &  
Paper Co., Ltd. is now operating to cap-  
acity and has been so employed for the  
past two or three weeks. This means  
that the company is turning out daily  
240 tons of pulp and 100 tons of kraft  
paper.

This is accepted as additional confir-  
mation that this industry is on the mend,  
and that much brighter times are ahead  
for this locality, which suffered consid-  
erably throughout the business depression  
and period of commodity deflation.

The fact that the export demand for  
kraft paper has revived to such a marked  
extent is accepted as auguring well for  
the future, and an active year for the  
district is now conceded.

It is understood that the enquiry for  
Wayagamek's products comes to a con-  
siderable extent from the company's cus-  
tomers in the United States, while en-  
quiries are being received in gratifying  
measure from foreign countries. One of  
these has been Japan which has been a  
good buyer in the past.

Another interesting point in connection  
with this industrial revival is the fact  
that prices for the output display an  
improving tendency. The margin of  
profit to the company will thus increase  
as time goes on and business broadens,  
and the uses to which kraft paper are  
put multiply.
