IMPOSTERS DUPE  
AMERICAN PUBLIC

Use Romance Surrounding R. C. M. P. to Better Financial Position.

Ottawa, March 24.—The romantic atmosphere surrounding the "riders of the plains," which has been lately played up in books and moving pictures of Canada, has led to the duping of the American public by a number of imposters. By representing themselves to be officers of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police these imposters have been able to gain entry to the best families of the United States to better themselves financially. Commissioner A. P. Perry stated that a number of such cases have been brought to his notice of late by inquiries received from different police forces across the border. In each case it was found that the person was an imposter and had never belonged to the force.

News was received last week of a man claiming to be a Captain Mackay, a member of the R. C. M. P. and an ex-Canadian army officer, who had been conducting a lecture tour throughout the New England states during the last few months. Travelling under false colors he has been the guest of honor at a number of banquets and banquets presided over by governors of states and mayors, and is even alleged to have been received by President Harding.

Warned to Leave State.  
Boston, March 21.—Daniel A. Mackay, who, styling himself a former captain of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, related his supposed experiences to many New England gatherings, gained the confidence of Governor Coolidge and Mayor Peters, and headed municipal committees, has been advised to leave the state, it was said at the office of the commissioner of public safety today.

A long list of lectures which Mackay had ahead of him has been cancelled, it is understood. Since his appearance in this vicinity several years ago, he had been appointed a vice investigation officer at Camp Devens; a special police officer in this city during the policemen's strike, and chairman of the city

committee on Patriot's Day celebration in 1919. Although an alien he took part in the political campaign of 1920. For a time he was associated with the United States Shipping Board offices here.

BIG SEIZURE OF  
DIAMONDS MADE

Brazil Man Taken in New York—Alleged Illegal Importation.

New York, March 24.—Diamonds whose wholesale value was estimated between \$85,000 and \$110,000 were seized yesterday by customs officials. Francisco Chamle, forty, a rubber dealer of Para, Brazil, alleged to have illegally imported the gems, was arrested while trying to dispose of them in a West Twenty-third street jewelry shop.

Chamle is said to have had in his possession eight envelopes, a knotted handkerchief and a hatband fitted with pockets, containing hundreds of diamonds. Twenty-five of the stones ranged in size from two to twelve karats, eight weighing more than eight karats. Most of the gems were unset, but fifteen were set in platinum rings of elaborate designs.

MANAGER DEAD AT 85

Kentville, N. S., March 24.—J. W. King, first mayor of Kentville, and at one time general manager of the Windsor and Annapolis Railway, now included in the Dominion Atlantic line, died here yesterday aged 85. Mr. King was a lawyer and a native of Scotland.
