### IRON, STEEL, METAL

### AND MACHINERY

In its summary of the iron, steel,  
metal and machinery markets for the  
week ended January 20, Canadian  
Machinery and Manufacturing News,  
Toronto, makes the following comment:

If indications, opinions and sum-  
maries are any indication of trade, there  
should be an improvement in the  
near future. Any one who is spending  
much time calling on the trade can  
plainly see that he is doing more business  
than he was a month ago. Orders for  
the most part are small, but they are  
coming in.

Stocks in warehouses and in manufac-  
turing establishments are light. There  
are only a few exceptions to this and  
some places still appear to be waiting  
to receive their account by taking back  
some of this over-stock. This is not  
being done, for the very good reason that  
the dealer is doing more business  
than he was a month ago. Orders for  
the most part are small, but they are  
coming in.

Steel prices hold firm and there seems  
to be little chance of any break, in fact  
many of those in the trade go so far as  
to say that any decided buying move-  
ment starting in now would cause a  
stiffening of prices above present values.  
Figures are now quoted at \$48.63 a ton,  
being a drop of about \$8 a ton from the  
last figure named. Even at the lower  
price buying is light in most cases, and  
there is very little immediate future.  
There has been hardly a start made yet  
in the old practice of placing orders for  
a year's supply.

The scrap metal market is very weak  
yet, but some of the dealers can see  
where they are going to make a start  
very soon in getting back to more ac-  
tive business. Canadian prices for near-  
ly every grade are higher than those  
offered at United States points.

### BUSINESS TALK

#### Washington Official Ad-

#### resses Canadian Club in

#### Montreal.

Montreal, Jan. 22.—R. S. MacIver,  
Director of the Bureau of Foreign and  
Domestic Commerce in Washington,  
speaking at a Canadian Club luncheon  
here yesterday on how men can be  
Bly educated for the promotion of for-  
eign trade, urged more reciprocity in  
North American trade with  
strengthening of international unity and  
co-operation.

Business, he said, was as much a pro-  
fession as the law, medicine and engi-  
neering, though it was the last to be  
recognized as such.

Mr. MacIver instanced what was be-  
ing done in the United States to show  
the influence of the bureau of foreign  
and domestic commerce,  
outlined the fourteen divisions of com-  
merce they administered and spoke of  
young men who made special progress  
through such specialized education.
