### MERCHANTS LOST

MILLION DOLLARS

THROUGH THEFT

During Year Detectives Re-

covered \$500,000 More—

One Store Caught 5,000

Thieves.

(Montreal Herald.)

One million dollars is the vast sum

of money lost in Montreal during the

past twelve months through thefts and

robberies committed in department

stores, wholesale houses and numerous

smaller establishments throughout the

city, the above figures being a conserva-

estimate arrived at by city and pri-

vate detective agencies. The recovery

of nearly \$600,000 by the city and pri-

vate agencies is not included in the total

loss. There has never been so persistent

and systematic thieving carried out in

accordance to the authorities mentioned in

hundreds and thousands of dollars

worth of goods, ranging from the five

cent smallest to the most ex-

travagant, dresses, coats and furs, have

been taken from the shelves of the

big up-town stores, where detectives

are employed to prevent thefts have suf-

fered from the light fingered gentry,

who play their vocations when the stores

are crowded and it becomes an easy

matter to brush past the clerks and

the floor to be pocketed when the

clerk's attention is directed elsewhere.

From one firm alone the detectives

have taken over 1,000 persons to the

court house during the past twelve

months and it was stated that the num-

ber of arrests is one-fifth less than

last year. The number of persons who

have been taken to the court house during

the year, brought to the man-

agement of the police and let go with a

warning, are said to be at the bottom of

many of the losses.

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### THE POLES AND

LITHUANIANS

Efforts of Anti-Bolshevik

Force Denounced as Im-

perialistic Plot—Russians

Stand Aloof.

Kovno, Lithuania, Nov. 30.—(Assoc-

iated Press Correspondence.)—The Lith-

uanian government has denounced as a

Polish imperialistic plot the effort of an

anti-Bolshevik force under the com-

mand of Boris Savinkoff to seize Minsk,

the most important city in White Rus-

sia. This venture is regarded by the Lith-

uanian officials with apprehension. They

say that Poles of various persuasions

are co-operating with Savinkoff and

they regard this action as an effort to

extend Polish territory far to the east-

ward at the expense of the Lithuanians

and the Russians.

Some of the Poles acting with Savin-

koff are said to have been sympathetic

with the seizure of Vilna by General

Zeligowski, who proclaimed the Lith-

uanian government which the Lithuanians
