

### EXILE THE WORST IN STORE FOR KAISER?

Amsterdam, June 29.—The Allies will not ask for the extradition of the former emperor, so the Paris correspondent of the *Telegraph* says he learns, but will ask the Dutch government in the name of the League of Nations to see that Herr Hohenzollern does not escape the moral consequences.

It is expected that as a member of the league, he will inform the former emperor that he must appear before an international court or leave the country. A high French authority on international law said the proceedings against the former emperor would be on moral grounds and the sentence would be of a moral character entirely. It was said there is no question of a death sentence or imprisonment.

It is probable, the correspondent continues, that the crimes of the former emperor against international morality in starting the war and in violating Belgian neutrality would be condemned severely, the Hohenzollern would be declared forever deposed and it would be made impossible for the former emperor to do further harm by assigning him to a place of residence from which he must not move.

### GERMAN PAPERS IN MOURNING DRESS

Berlin, June 29.—(By the Associated Press)—Some of the Berlin papers, announcing the signing of the treaty, appeared in black borders, with captions such as "Germany's Fate Sealed," "Peace and Annihilation." The *Tages Zeitung* in closing an editorial, says:—"Clemenceau, Lloyd George and Wilson and their accessories have sown dragon's teeth of eternal enmity."

The whole German press writes in the strain of melancholy pessimism. The *Tageliche Rundschau* says:—"What we need is a despot to compel the nation to work. If we are unable to install him our enemies will send him."

Dr. Dernburg in the *Tageblatt* says:—"The cup is drained to the dregs. There is no sense in continuing this controversy. It is better to endeavor quickly to find our feet. The concessions made to us are not without value, and open the way to certain alleviations."

Berlin, June 29.—(By the Associated Press)—The Evangelical churches of Germany will celebrate Sunday, July 6, as a day of mourning. It will be requested that quiet prevail and that Germany make an earnest effort to recuperate by consistent work. The church bells will chime a hymn of mourning.

### AIR FORCE IS TO BE MAINTAINED IN CANADA

London, June 29.—(By the Canadian Associated Press)—At a dinner of the Canadian Air Force at Shoreham, General Currie announced that the air force would be maintained in Canada. He said the dominion as a partner in the empire must bear an adequate share in responsibility. He advocated the retention of identity of units that had served in France in the re-organized militia, to maintain the traditions built up in the field.

### BAVARIAN PRINCE REPORTED ENTERING A JESUIT MONASTERY

Munich, June 30.—Newspapers say that Prince George, eldest son of Prince Louis of Bavaria, has entered a Jesuit monastery at Insbruck.


Prince George of Bavaria was born in Munich on April 2, 1880. He was married to Archduchess Isabel of Austria.


