GOOD THINGS COMING TO THEATRES OF ST. JOHN

GERARD PICTURE REGULAR PRICES

"My Four Years in Germany" at Imperial Theatre Next Week Will be Noteworthy Booking—Shown Elsewhere at High Prices

Commencing Monday, October 7th

Imperial Theatre will screen for its patrons that most remarkable historical narrative, "My Four Years in Germany," being the personal experiences of Ambassador Gerard of the United States, previous to the beginning of the present great war and until the breaking off of diplomatic relations between his country and that of the Kaiser.

St. John people who have visited American cities during the past year have been continually requesting the Imperial management to have this picture brought to St. John, as they considered it the most interesting and life-like re-enactment it had been their privilege to see. Consequently upon the earliest opportunity the Keith interests here have contracted for this ten reel feature which will be run four days beginning on the date above mentioned.

The picture has already been shown in private in this city to a jury of representative citizens and all claim for it the distinction of being the most remarkable and educational treatment of Germany's attitude in the war yet written or pictured. There is no attempt at filmed fiction throughout the ten thousand feet of photographs, no silly or mawkish sentimental stuff, but genuine incident upon incident with the actual conversational language employed in each scene as dictated and directed to the wonderful cast of players by Mr. Gerard himself under permission from President Wilson and the American government.

"My Four Years in Germany" has been allowed for public use as justification for America's entry into the present struggle and the raising of her national life for the sake of liberty and democracy. The Imperial feels it is doing a public duty in presenting it and once it is seen by the people of St. John it will be warmly commended for bringing an excessively high contract price in bringing it here.

The price of admission will not be changed at the matinees and in the evening the only difference will be a straight quarter dollar admission for the lower floor instead of the split prices, fifteen and twenty-five.
