**BERLIN'S WORKERS**  
**FACE STARVATION**

**Capitalists Ruined, Factories Closed**  
**and S selfish Rich Reduce Poor**  
**to Misery**

The Cologne Gazette paints a terrible picture of industrial workers' conditions in Berlin.

"A conference has been held at the Ministry of Interior to discuss the great unemployment. Rich women and men have dismissed most of their employees and will soon dismiss more. Most women clerks, typists, and assistants have been discharged because their employers are at war or are ruined."

and homeworkers are starving. The textile industry is suffering fearfully and dismissing its workers, mostly women, by crowds. Other factories shut down because the mobilization has taken away their male workers. Women who run boarding-houses or let rooms are ruined. At the conference it was complained that the ruthlessness of the rich was reducing unnumbered women to misery, and they were exhorted not to dismiss their employees.

The town of Gelsenkirchen has bought 10,000 tons of footstuffs to be sold at a fair price. Durlberg has set apart \$260,000 for the poor. It is estimated that there are 7,000 families each with three children, who need help.

At Gelsenkirchen 28,000 women help. Each family receives 27 shillings a month, from the imperial treasury, and the same amount from the municipal treasury.

The British Admiralty has taken delivery of a new destroyer, a sister ship to the *Albatross*, and the *Albatross* is to sink the *Lancaster*, which was prominent in the sinking of the German mine-laying steamer *Königs Luise*. The new vessel is a 1,000-ton, 16-knot boat, and has been built by Messrs Thornycroft, of Southampton, who delivered the boat at a cost of £100,000.

The *Lancaster* and *Albatross* belong to a class of twenty destroyers, of which the *Lancaster* was the first, provided for the fleet in 1910. The *Albatross* is one of the swiftest vessels afloat. They have a displacement of 980-1,000 tons, and are fitted with 10 4-inch guns, 4 6-inch quick firing guns and four 21-in. torpedoes. They have an oil capacity of 1,500 tons. A 100-ton oil tank is carried for the crew, as capital is required for the slightly more powerful "B" class now being built.
