**PEACE LEAGUE FOR WHOLE AMERICAN CONTINENT**

John M. Stewart, of New York, chairman of the executive committee of the United States Peace Centenary Association, who is in Ottawa conferring with the Canadian committee, says that as a result of the awful war spectacle in Europe, a conference of representatives of all the nations of North and South America is likely to be called to form a league for peace, a league that would mean the respect by each country for the territorial integrity of every other country and united all against territorial aggrandisement by an outside nation.

"The American people as a nation," he said, "are studiously observing the letter of their neutrality in this war. Such men as Ex-President Taft and Roosevelt and Judge Parker have pointed out that the influence of the United States in the matter of the peace which is to come some time, will depend almost entirely on the degree to which we are able to observe the letter of our neutrality obligation."

"Apart from neutrality and without particular regard to the outcome of the war, the war itself has seemed to urge upon the people of the United States the acceptance of a duty in the direction of safeguarding the interests collectively of the nations of the western hemisphere, and I am advocating the calling of an international conference at Washington for the purpose of organizing a league of peace."

"This matter has been discussed with eminent representatives of American nations, and has received their hearty approval."

**DISMISS PROFESSOR OR LOSE TEN MILLIONS**

Ultimatum to Harvard by Englishman, Formerly a Student

(Boston Globe.)

"Dismiss Prof. Munsterberg or lose \$10,000,000," is the astounding alternative offered to Harvard University by Maj. Clarence Wiener of Surrey, Eng., of the class of 1900, Harvard, in a letter addressed to Dean LeBaron R. Briggs. Boldly denouncing Professor Munsterberg's "virulent and scurrilous attacks on the allied powers, most particularly since the inception of the great war," Maj. Wiener demands his dismissal from the Harvard faculty.

In the event of Harvard's retaining the renowned psychological expert, Major Wiener declares that he will withdraw a gift of \$2,000,000, nearly \$10,000,000, which would accrue to Harvard upon his death.

A copy of this letter has come to the Globe. Up to last evening President Lowell had not received the missive, but had received through the mail under date of Sept. 29 a post card which presented the proposition in substance. The letter said to be on its way to Mr. Lowell, dated Sept. 30, 1914, from Ewell Castle, Surrey, Eng., supplements the post card with a more fluent and more extended recital of the author's grievances against the learned doctor.

Major Wiener does not mince matters. His words are bitter and boldly chosen. "I write very strongly because I feel very strongly on the matter," says one portion of the letter.

Just how strongly the major writes at some points it is the part of discretion not to disclose, but his ultimatum is presented in the following terms:

"As you no doubt know, I am a member of the class of 1900, and, as I wrote you, Harvard would have benefited, in the event of my death, to the extent of \$2,000,000. As then advised, this clause is rescinded and will remain so until I receive a written assurance from the faculty that the German doctor has been removed from your list of professors."

**MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES**

Chester Russell of Pomeroy Ridge, charged with assault upon Miss Mary Forsythe, a young school teacher of Littleton on September 14, was sentenced at the sitting of the Charlotte county circuit court last week to twenty-five years in Dorchester by Mr. Justice Barrow. Attorney-General Clarke conducted the prosecution and Daniel Mullin, K. C. appeared for the prisoner.

The home of William Forsythe at Mount Hebron, Kings county, was burned on October 6 while he was visiting one of his neighbors. It is said that Mr. Forsythe had no fire in the house that day and it is believed that the fire was caused by a quantity of furniture and trunks removed from the burning building to an open field were piled up and burned during the night. Constables are now on the trail of the firebug.
