Swiftness of the World Over

The Hawaiian Republic convention, in session at Honolulu, September 17, adopted a platform asking congress to grant statehood and to amend the organic laws so as to give suffrage to women, as the native women particularly are firm in their demand for the franchise.

Belgium cables report that the government is on the point of yielding to popular demand for the introduction of a bill providing for universal suffrage. The measure will give the right to vote to every man and woman who they reach their majority and a double vote to male heads of families.

Woman suffrage has become so important an issue in Germany, says the New York Evening Post, that political parties are obliged to take notice of it. The Social Democrats have declared in favor of it in the Prussian chamber; the liberal Unions have done likewise, and a few representatives of the Centre have also committed themselves affirmatively.

Women are said to be seething with sentiment favorable to woman suffrage. "Rights of Women," official organ of the Romanian Woman Suffrage Association, edited by Mme. Janulescu, reports that meetings are being held in all parts of the country and the demands for speakers and literature are pouring in at such a rapid rate that it is impossible to supply them.

RIG BADLY SMASHED

Livery Stable Outfit Comes to Grief in Provincial Hospital Grounds

A bad smashup occurred on the Provincial Hospital grounds in Lancaster early yesterday morning, and as a result a carriage owned by William Gibson, who conducts a stable in King Square, was demolished. The accident happened about five o'clock. The team was hired out on Saturday night to a young man who resides in Carleton, and at five o'clock Sunday morning it was found by the engineer employed at the asylum, lying on the asylum grounds, badly crippled. The horse was standing nearby.

According to a paperboy who saw the accident, the horse was turned in on the asylum grounds by the driver, who drove around the pathways several times, before colliding with the asylum building. One occupant managed to get out, but the horse kept on running and ran into a large elm tree, doing considerable more damage to the carriage and harness. The engineer hearing shouts, ran out and captured the horse. The occupants of the carriage did not wait. It may be that action will be taken by the owner of the rig.

LORD RUSSELL A SOCIALIST

First of House of Lords to Become One—His Reasons

London, Dec. 9.—The Fabian society, an organization formed to promote socialist ideas among the middle and upper classes, has added to its membership the name of Earl Russell, the first member of the House of Lords to become a socialist. George Bernard Shaw is a prominent Fabian, and H. G. Wells, novelist, did much to extend the society's reputation, but has now withdrawn from it.

THE CHINESE CASE

Hearing in the case of Hum Yung vs. Hum Foo was continued in the police court this morning. Several witnesses were called by D. Mullin, K. C. for the plaintiff, to rebut evidence given for the defence, after which the case was further adjourned. At the beginning of the hearing this morning W. H. Harrison for the defence, stated that he did not wish to call any more witnesses. Mr. Mullin recalled Hum Ho Thome. He said he was not present in Hop Lee's shop on May 13 or 14, when Len Choon, a witness for the defence, said that the notes were drawn and Hum Foo's name signed to them. The witness said he had been in Montreal all during May, and that he had never offered Hum Foo \$400 for his business. In reply to Mr. Harrison he said he did not run a gambling place, nor did he play cards for money. He had never seen any gambling in Hop Lee's store.

Probing Loss of Millions in Sale of De Luxe Editions

CAN MAKE FAST TIME ON G. T. P. IN NEW BRUNSWICK

Favorable Report Made by Officials After Recent Inspection

Montreal, Dec. 9.—That the eastern section of the transcontinental railway comes fully up to the expectations of the officials, was the statement given out this morning at the Grand Trunk offices by J. E. Dalrymple and G. T. Bell of the Grand Trunk passenger department; E. Tiffin, of the I. C. R. commission, and E. P. Cross, general superintendent of the National Transcontinental Railway, who have just completed a tour of inspection from Montreal to thirty miles west of Edmonton, 260 miles.
