NOW TOTAL 5,300

New Directory Shows Increase of 642 in the Year — Exchange Opened at Gagetown

The steady growth of business of this province and the continued prosperity of the people is indicated by figures supplied by the New Brunswick Telephone Company. The telephone business is generally taken as an excellent barometer by which to judge business conditions and the showing of the provincial company is eminently satisfactory in this respect.

This year it will take 17,000 directores to supply the subscribers of the company and this is an increase of 2,000 over last year's figures. The number in this section, known as the southern division and which includes St. John and all the territory between Sussex and St. Stephen, is 8,600; in the western division, from Fredericton to Edmundston 4,200, and in the eastern division from Sackville to Campbellton, 4,200. There are now 4,800 telephone instruments in use in St. John, an increase of 642 during the last year.

In order to accommodate the increased business it has been necessary to add a new section to the switchboard, providing accommodation for 400 new main lines and requiring the services of three additional operators. The new apparatus, which has just been completed, was installed by an expert from the Kellogg Company, Chicago.

The efficiency of the local exchange has also been increased by the installation of an elaborate piece of apparatus used for testing the wires. When trouble is reported on a line this apparatus is brought into use and by means of it the nature of the trouble and its probable location can be determined before the repair men leave the office.

A new exchange has been established by the company at Gagetown. There are thirty subscribers to start with and this number is expected to increase.

Distribution of the new directories for this city will commence next Monday.

One man was on the bench charged with being a common vagrant. He said he had been in the Alms House before and on his saying that he had found it a pretty good place was sent back there by the magistrate.
