Car Into Gulley On Family Outing; Father Is Killed

Cobalt, Ont., June 23—Plunging through a bridge railing to a 30 foot drop in a guiley three miles north of New Liskeard, yesterday, a motor car containing Wilfrid Adolph Soucle, a prominent New Liskeard merchant and six of his eight children, crushed the life out of the father and perhaps fatally injured two of the children who were with him.

Wilfrid Soucie, 17 year old son of the man who was killed, was driving the car. The automobile ripped off 100 feet of railing and turned a complete somersault before crashing to the rock ground. Mr. Soucie was probably instantly killed and four of the six children were rendered unconscious.



Irvin Hartman, Jr., whose life was threatened in a note sent to his parents, has been sent to Baltimore with his fourteen-year-old sister, where they will be under special guard with Mrs. Joseph Greenwald, their grandmother, at the home of an aunt, Mrs. Irving J. Spear.

Both the Franks and Hartman letters are believed by Jacob Franks, father of the siain Robert, to be part of a plot to defeat the ends of Justice in the prosecution of Leopoid and Loeb. He thinks the letter threatening to kidnap his daughter is intended to scare him into seeking clemency for them and that the threat against Irvin Hartman is an effort to get him out of the way, as he is one of the witnesses against the student slayers. The police, however, and Justice Caverly ascribe both letters to cranks, excited by the Frank case.
