He received inquiries from A. C. Jensen of Bluebell Post Office, Victoria county, asking what steps could be taken to have a branch organized there, and sent all information necessary, but had heard nothing regarding it since. He also had inquiries from Rev. F. E. Boothroyd of Campbellton, N. B., W. C. Rayworth of Sackville, and Mrs. J. W. Cassidy of Burnt Church, Northumberland county, N. B., but was sorry that no further steps had been taken by these people to organize.

He had much pleasure in reporting the reorganizing of the St. Stephen Branch, through the efforts of W. S. Stevens, son of the late Judge Stevens, who for so many years was an efficient president of that branch of the society.

Animal Rescue League. "The Animal Rescue League is a great joy to the public in general," he reports, "in the wonderful work it is doing. As I stated last year, to carry on their work successfully, the league needs a conveyance of some sort, in which sick or maimed domestic animals may be brought to the home for humane treatment. It is almost a dally occurrence at my office to have in-

occurrence at my office to have in-quiries as to the disposal of some ani-mal in distress. So I urge the public to assist the league in every way pos-"Our society is much in need of financial assistance, and we are in hopes that in the near future, conditions will improve to such an extent that the dumb animals will benefit to a great

degree.
"I think it would be well if our executive would take up the matter of 'Be Kind to Animal Work,' and make it a great success as carried out in other

ta great success as carried out in other places."

The secretary expressed thanks to all who had helped in his work, and mentioned J. King Kelley, Dr. Donovan, the Chief of Police and his officers. "I feel that I must speak in particular of Sergeant Rankine, who has come to my aid so often and so willingly. My thangs are also due to our president, D. C. Clinch, whose valuable knowledge of dumb animals has been of such assistance to me; also to the country constables for their kind help."

A tabulated statement shows that 103 horses were removed from work, for various reasons and 119 owners of horses—were cautioned for different causes. Cases relative to cattle and other stock numbered 25; dogs ill-treated, 16; dogs and cats destroyed, 13; cats ill-treated, nine; fowls and birds, eight; children ill-treated, 12; children neglected, 12; women ill-treated, four; women neglected, five. In all the cases numbered 326. Eleven were taken to court and fines totalling \$110 were struck.

Animal Rescue.

Miss Lilian Hazen, reporting for the Animal Rescue League, said:

"Just now the society is astir with much activity. We have many new members, many hopes and ambitions, many plans in embryo, and we feel assured that under the business-like leadership of our president, Mrs. Peck, we shall make progress. Although much has been accomplished in the past to establish and improve our premises and make them suitable, a good deal yet remains to be done ere we shall we satisfied the league is the place it ought to be. But we can do it, and we shall do it, little by little. The hardest part is over.


