

BUILDING DEBT OF Y. W. C. A. CUT \$1,300 IN YEAR

Deficit on Operations of Association \$240 in 12 Months

DEPARTMENTS OF WORK REVIEWED

Residence Paying Its Way— Annual Meeting Elects Directors.

The financial statement at the annual meeting of the Y. W. C. A. last night was received with general satisfaction. The deficit on the year's operations had been only \$240. \$1,300 had been paid towards the indebtedness on buildings; the value of the residence had been increased greatly by many improvements and all arrears of salary had been paid, and yet the deficit of the previous year had been increased by only a comparatively small sum.

Miss C. O. McGivern, treasurer, gave a detailed statement of the operations of each department, telling of Mrs. W. J. Angus' untiring efforts through which a sustaining fund was opened.

Mrs. E. C. Weyman, president, was in the chair and opening devotions were led by Mrs. James F. Robertson. A social evening was enjoyed at the close of the meeting and refreshments were served. The Lotus flower dance by Joan Andrews and Alice Chisholm was a delightful interlude.

PRESIDENT REPORTS.

Mrs. Weyman, in her report, told of the association having carried on without a general secretary as a means of economy. She gave praise to Miss Edna Hunt, office secretary; Mrs. H. P. Hayes, girls' secretary; and to Mrs. W. J. Angus, whose spirit of service had been a splendid inspiration.

Mrs. Wetmore spoke of the cheery financial statement.

Mrs. John A. McAvity reported a more lively interest in the membership enrollment in the churches. The 18 churches reported 922 members contributing \$882.

TRAVELERS' AID.

The Travelers' Aid report, given by Mrs. James F. Robertson, paid a glowing tribute to the three workers, Miss Hoyt, Miss Kirk and Mrs. Forbes, who retained the activities in meeting 2,880 trains, assisting 1,218 persons and sheltering 1,218 persons.
