Voluntary Army Suggested.

A plan is under discussion in military circles for the creation of a voluntary army for Russian relief, should the Allies agree upon the policy of feeding Russia.

Daylight in Archangel now is of only four hours' duration, and this fact, with the fog, facilitates the guerrilla warfare of the Bolsheviks, operating in the shelter of the forests. It is believed that evacuation of the Archangel district by the Allies would probably result in the murder of the entire population friendly to the Entente by the Bolsheviks.

Claims Wide Jurisdiction.

Vladivostok, Nov. 22.—(By the Associated Press)—General Semonoff, who has been the anti-Bolshevik leader in the Trans-Baikal region, has interrupted his communication between Omsk, the seat of the all-Russian government, and Vladivostok. He asserts his jurisdiction over the Amur, Ussuri and Trans-Baikal districts, and has established headquarters at Chita.

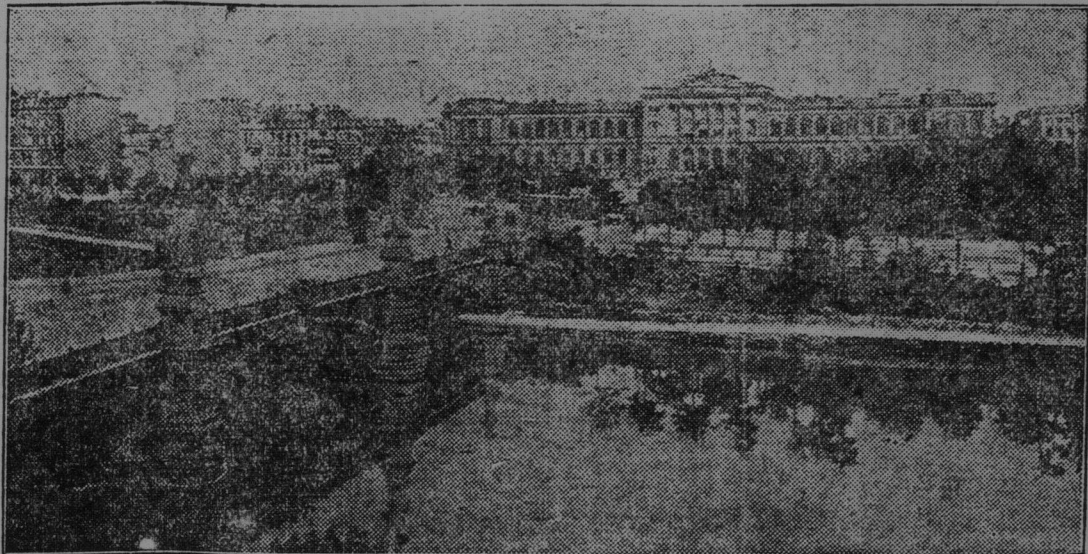

"No, sah," said Ned, gloomily. "I didn't get mah freedom, sah. After the war I done got married."

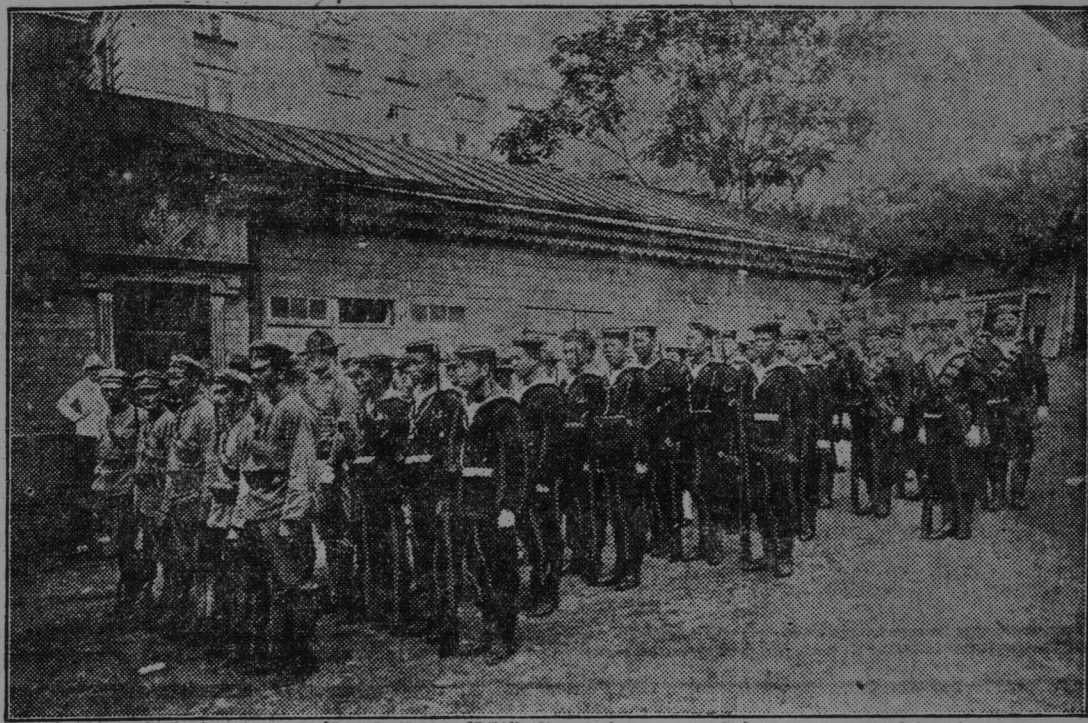

BELIEVE DICTATORSHIP IN RUSSIA CAN'T LAST

"Smacks Too Much of Monarchism"—British and U. S. Forces Meet Strong Resistance—Czecho-Slovak Forces Remain.

Harbin, Saturday, Nov. 23.—(By the Associated Press)—The Czecho-Slovak forces in Russia are not interested in the internal affairs in Russia and they desire to return to their homeland, but will remain in Russia because the Allied governments have requested them to do so, declares General Stefanik, minister of war in the Czecho-Slovak government. The general was in Harbin today on his way to the Volga front.

General Stefanik believes that if force is used to break up opposition to Bolshevik question can be decided in weeks rather than in months.

The newspapers in Harbin express the belief that the dictatorship of Admiral Kolchak in the all-Russian government at Omsk will not last long. They declare that the new governmental plan smacks of monarchism.

Strong Opposition.

Archangel, Nov. 23.—(By the Associated Press)—The Entente and American troops have encountered strong opposition both on the Volga-Archangel railway and on the Drina river. Owing to the swampy condition of the terrain, it has been necessary to confine operations to the waterway and the railway. As the upper part of the river is deeper than at its mouth the Bolshevik craft, equipped with large guns, have been able to manœuvre there than the Entente ships and have prevented the occupation of Kotlas by the Entente.
