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MADERO DETAINED

He May Have to Answer Some Awkward Charges.

GEN. HUERTA IS SWORN IN

Death of a Colonel Is Laid at Door of the Deposed President of Mexico and He May Be Called on to Say Where National Funds Have Gone—Crowds Welcome New Rulers With "Vivas."

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 21.—That Francisco Madero will get out of Mexico without having to face official investigations for one thing or another now appears improbable. He has already been charged with responsibility for the death of Col. Riveroll, whom he is alleged to have shot at the time of his arrest in the palace.

The last details of the organization of Mexico's new Government were completed at four o'clock yesterday afternoon, when the members of President Huerta's official family took the oath in the yellow room in the palace immediately above that occupied by the deposed President and vice-president.

Unable to witness the scenes from their room, Madero and Suarez were yet able to hear the plaudits of the crowds in the streets and in the big square in front and the bugle calls of the united army. Significant of the birth in battle of the new administration was the frank display of soldiers, and the effect on the crowd was not lost.

It served as a reminder that even if it was not a military dictatorship that had been established, the present administration was of much sterner quality than that which has just fallen.

Gen. Felix Diaz was among those in the yellow room when the Ministers took the oath and heard Huerta pronounce the formal time-honored phrase: "If you keep this country, you will reward you; if you do not, it will call you to an accounting."

Gen. Diaz was present ostensibly in no official capacity, but merely as a private citizen, which he became many months ago when he resigned his commission as a general in the regular army.

Madero and Pino Suarez betrayed in their faces the chagrin and humiliation which they must have felt, according to officers of the guard. Federico Gonzalez Garza, the former governor of the federal district, is a third prisoner occupying the room. There is no partition. Each man is furnished with a bed and meals are brought periodically and served jointly.

Outside the room stands a guard of soldiers, and although there are no windows in the room another guard is constantly on duty within, even during the sleeping hours.

No one has been allowed to talk with the prisoners, although their wives have been permitted to send verbal messages. Madero has signed nothing regarding his future plans, even if permitted to leave the country. The members of his family are equally reticent, but by those most intimate with them it is considered not improbable that the entire family will emigrate to South America if the opportunity is afforded them.

Gen. Diaz came into his own late in the afternoon, so far as a mitigation of popular approval was concerned. Riding at the head of his troops, which for nine days withstood the attacks of the Government, Diaz received an ovation as had not been witnessed here since the triumphal entrance of Madero at the close of his revolution.

All political prisoners throughout the country have been ordered released by President Huerta.

One hundred and fifty prisoners in the penitentiary here, hitherto overlooked, were discovered yesterday afternoon and set free.

MIRABILE DICTUI

London (Eng.) Editors Are Agreed on a Civic Improvement.

LONDON, Feb. 21.—A remarkable departure has been made in connection with the campaign to force the London County Council to purchase certain property at the corner of Trafalgar Square, near the new Admiralty Arch, so as to open up the noble avenue, which leads to the Victoria monument in front of Buckingham Palace.

The appeal is signed by the editors of London newspapers, morning and evening, with one notable exception, The Times. The editors' signatures are: The Telegraph, Mail, Standard, Mirror, Daily News, Chronicle, Express, Citizen, Graphic, Sketch, Evening News, Evening Standard, Pall Mall Gazette, Westminster, Star and Globe. Such unanimity among London editors is unparalleled and their appeal to the public through their own newspapers is unprecedented.

Honest Men Need Not Fear.

TRENTON, N.J., Feb. 21.—"Honest business and honest men have nothing to fear." This is the assurance which President-elect Wilson gave yesterday in a lengthy statement explaining the enactment into law of the seven anti-trust bills which he signed yesterday.

Will Organize Cadets.

KINGSTON, Feb. 21.—Geo. Gillespie has been appointed inspector and organizer of Cadet Corps for the third division. His salary will be \$1,500 per year. Gillespie is a member of the City Council and prominent insurance agent.

MURDER IN HAMILTON.

Boarding-House Keeper Slays Lodger and Wounds Wife.

HAMILTON, Feb. 20.—One of the most brutal murders in the history of Hamilton occurred yesterday morning, when Casimir Linkewitz, a Russian, boarding at the house of Wasi Boyko, 236 Ferguson avenue, was struck over the head with an axe and died a few moments afterward. Mrs. Boyko, the wife of the landlord, was also struck with the weapon and is at present in the hospital, where her death is hourly expected. Wasi Boyko was placed under arrest, charged with murder.

The story told the police is to the effect that the two men had been out until a late hour the night previous and returned home very much the worse of liquor, and in a short time started a fight. It is said that Boyko charged the murdered man with paying attention to his wife, and a fight ensued. Having got the worst of the fight, it is said that Boyko turned and struck her with the hatchet, inflicting a terrible wound. He then dragged his victim through the kitchen and across the yard to the woodshed, where he left him, either dead or soon to die. After this Boyko, if it was he who committed the deed, returned to the house, picked his wife from the floor, placed her on the bed and then retired.

Cuddled up between the injured woman and the accused at the time of the arrest was a seven-months-old child. It was at first thought that it too had been injured owing to the amount of blood upon it, but it was soon found that the child was unharmed.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

Wintry weather prevails in France and southern Italy.

The C.P.R. is to spend \$16,000,000 on the new line from Montreal to Toronto.

The New Jersey Senate extended to women the right to vote. The resolution passed 14 to 5 and now goes to the House.

J. K. Pickett, general manager of the Imperial Life, has tendered his resignation to enter into business on his own account.

The appointment of a commission to consider the cost of living will be argued at the coming meeting of the associated Boards of Trade.

The interested municipalities will approach the Federal and Provincial Governments for aid in behalf of the proposed radial to Port Perry.

Mrs. John McMahon, known as Kingston's grand old lady, aged 81, is dead. She was the widow of the late John McMahon and came from Ireland when a girl.

Premier Fisher of Australia in conjunction with states premiers has agreed to make an adequate contribution to the fund in aid of the dependents of the South Pole victims.

Solomon Jaki, 25 years old, a Finlander, attempted to smuggle 33 pounds of pure silver ore across the lower steel arch bridge at Niagara Falls yesterday, but was caught.

Alfred Crouch, an engineer in the employ of the G.T.R. for more than thirty years, was stricken with heart failure a few minutes after finishing his run from London to Windsor.

The Reichstag yesterday adopted by a majority, made up of Clericals, Socialists and three Radicals, the measure repealing the anti-Jesuit law. It is considered most improbable that the Bundesrat will concur.

HE WANTS A CHANCE.

Dr. Friedmann Prepared to Demonstrate Tuberculosis Cure.

PLYMOUTH, Eng., Feb. 20.—Dr. Friedrich F. Friedmann, who asserts he has discovered a cure for tuberculosis, gave an interview yesterday on board the Kronprinzessin Cecilie on his way to America to demonstrate the value of his remedy. He said:

"I feel that the first step I should take in the United States should be to treat cases of visible tuberculosis in the presence of American physicians. I could thereby accomplish the double purpose of instructing them and proving the efficiency of the use of live germs. What I mean by visible tuberculosis is fungi in the knee, for instance, which are visible to the eye. I shall be glad if any doctors of important institutions in the United States will give me a chance to treat such cases."

STICKS TO HIS GUNS.

Pres. Detweiler Says Statements Can Be Fully Substantiated.

BERLIN, Feb. 20.—President D. B. Detweiler, of the Great Waterways Union, interviewed yesterday concerning the dissatisfaction of the North Bay town council, over the attitude of the union on the Georgian Bay Canal and French River improvement, stated that the union fully appreciated the responsibility of the statements made at the meeting here on the 14th, but he claimed that they are fully substantiated in the exhaustive report read at the meeting, and to be distributed generally in a few days.

Chaplain Fish Recovers.

PETROLEA, Feb. 20.—Rev. H. A. Fish of Owen Sound, supreme chaplain of the Orange Grand Lodge, will be discharged from Englehart Hospital today after five days' treatment for poisoning, the origin of which is a mystery. He had been lecturing in Lambton and on Saturday was taken violently ill on a Michigan Central train coming from Bridgen. Lodge brethren had him rushed to Petrolea hospital in a baggage car and he expects to keep an engagement at Wyomington today.

WHERE DO THEY GO?

Mr. Sinclair Inquires After Grand Jury Findings.

AND MR. HANNA IS ANGRY

Provincial Secretary Makes a Vigorous Retort to Question by Assailing Mr. Justice Latchford—Extension of the Franchise For Women Will Be Brought In This Session—Auto License Reciprocity.

TORONTO, Feb. 20.—"What does the Government do with grand jury presentments?" This pointed question by W. E. N. Sinclair, Liberal member for South Ontario in the Legislature yesterday, aroused the ire of Hon. W. J. Hanna, who "attacked" Mr. Justice Latchford, who was appointed by the late Liberal administration, because of his comments on incorrect findings of grand juries.

Mr. Sinclair made a motion for a return showing all the presentments made by grand juries during last year, and in speaking on it, criticized the Government for alleged laxity in dealing with the recommendations. He asked if the people got the benefit of the records or were they taken to "their last resting place in the Departments and thereafter treated as dead documents." All the presentments were important, as they represented the feelings of the people of the country, and the grand juries were the leading citizens of the community.

Hon. Mr. Hanna said all the presentments found their way to his Department and were thoroughly investigated. He suggested that the member for South Ontario could have expressed surprise with respect to how far some of the findings were from the facts. Many of the documents contained incorrect information.

The Provincial Secretary then pointed to a recent case in Whitby, Mr. Sinclair's own riding. The grand jury found two men incarcerated in a jail. They were both insane and ought to have been in an asylum. "The grand jury brought in a presentment to this effect," said Mr. Hanna. "It was their feeling that their keep should have been charged to the Government and not to the county. The jurors were quite indignant. The judge who received the presentment was also quite indignant and spoke freely of the laxity of my Department." He said that the judge who had attacked his Department was at one time a member of the Liberal Government, and during his years in the House such things had passed his notice.

"I received no notification from the county that these two men were in the jail when they should have been in an asylum," said Mr. Hanna. "So it was not the fault of the Government. The first intimation I got of the matter was in the grand jury's presentment."

"I am sorry that the judges of the land are dragged into such matters," said Mr. Rowell. He referred to Mr. Hanna as being "stunned up" over the case and his nature was usually so mild and placid. He believed that the views as expressed by the judge were justified, as all the judges base their comments on the finding of the jury.

Mr. Hanna again arose: "It is not one occasion but two and three and more occasions. I do not apologize in the House or out of the House for answering the remarks of a judge from the bench affecting my Department. I do not hesitate or apologize for answering these remarks on the floor of the House, because these remarks were made by him in a capacity where I have no opportunity of answering him, and if he has no opportunity here to-day, the account is squared."

During the consideration of the reconstructed Ontario Municipal Act in the Legislature yesterday, Hon. Mr. Hanna made a statement that a law would likely be enacted this session providing for the extension of the municipal franchise to married women who own property. The newly-revised act was under consideration prior to the second reading.

J. C. Elliott will introduce an amendment to the act to give married women property owners the right to vote in municipal elections.

Following Mr. Rowell's arraignment of the Government a few days ago because the prosecutions in 1905 against the tack combine had been dropped, J. C. Elliott, Liberal for West Middlesex, asked the Attorney-General if any members of the combine or counsel had interviewed him with a view to having the case abandoned. Hon. J. J. Foy answered the question in one word, "No."

T. Marshall of Monck criticized the Government because of "the many peculiarities of the advisory council of education." "The advisory council has gone into decline," said Mr. Marshall. "There seems to be no interest manifested among the people of the province. One of its chief peculiarities is that the conferees of the council are of a confidential nature. The representatives who are elected to the council are unable to say what transpires at the meetings. Judging by this fact alone, the council does not seem to be very useful."

In replying, Hon. Dr. Fyne said he had no idea as to the source of the Liberal member's information, but he was sure that it was incorrect. He praised the work of the council and stated that it was appointed to bring educational matters before the people, which it did.

The bill providing for reciprocity of motorcar licenses between Ontario and Quebec, introduced by J. A. Ellis of West Ottawa, passed its second reading.

Killed by Fall of Tree.

GUELPH, Feb. 20.—Jacob Freis, who lives near Elmira, while out cutting wood with his brother Albert, met almost instantaneous death by the fall of a tree. He leaves a wife and family of five children. The accident happened near Heidelberg.

Woodstock's Side of It.
Woodstock, Feb. 20.—That the charges made by the Guelph club against the Woodstock club regarding the eligibility of Player Jack Timms, the Berlin boy who has played left wing for the Industrial City youngsters this year, are absolutely false, is the statement made by the President and Secretary of the local club.

Regarding the charge that Timms did not leave Berlin for Woodstock until August 6 the club has evidence which should establish that the player in question was here during the last week in July, and it is stated that the payroll of the Bain Wagon Company by whom Timms is employed, shows that he began work on July 31. The officers of the Woodstock club had no communication with Timms regarding his coming to Woodstock, and it is stated that the Berlin boy made the jump after he had asked a Woodstock boy working in Berlin at the time, to get him a position here.

It is alleged that by false pretenses the statement was secured from Mrs. Timms that her son did not leave Berlin until August 1. The local club has a man now in Berlin making an investigation.

The Globe says—The Guelph protest against Timms, of Woodstock, has modified somewhat in the charge filed. The only objection raised now is on the residence rule. The charge of receiving money turned out to be mere gossip, with no foundation at all.
