Mrs. Sutherland, of 537 Euclid avenue, Toronto, fell from a street car near the corner of Dufferin and Queen streets, yesterday morning, and was badly injured. She was carried into the Dominion Redditor Company's factory on Dufferin, at, and later removed to the Western Hospital in the ambulance.

He is in no danger unless he has breathed in some of the steam. If he has it will not be known for at least twenty-four hours from the time of the accident.

Peterborough Examiner: Dr. R. W. Bell of the Provincial Board of Health, Toronto, passed through town today on his way from Campbellford, where he has been investigating an outbreak of smallpox. Two men residing in the vicinity of Heard's Station have contracted the disease, but owing to the prompt and efficient action of the local health authorities, an epidemic, it is hoped, will be prevented. The patients have been placed in quarantine and every precaution taken to prevent contagion. No trace was discovered of the origin of the outbreak.

Snatching a chateleine containing thirty-nine meal tickets from the cash box near the door of Mrs. Annie Cartwright's restaurant at 109 East King street, Toronto, Emma Graham ran out of the door and east along King street. Mrs. Cartwright who was on her way back to the box when the theft took place, ran out to the door and followed her along the street, yelling "Stop thief." The attention of P. C. Bond, who was a block away from the running woman, was called and the Graham woman ran almost into his arms before she saw him. She was arrested and taken to No. 1 police station, where she lodged over night.

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NO COST FOR TRANSFER.

Fortifications Must Be Held For Military Purposes Only. Ottawa, Sept. 2.—A cable has been received from the Imperial Government stating that the War Council recommended that the War Department should transfer to the Canadian Government free of charge all the fortifications in Nova Scotia, which the Dominion is prepared to take over for military purposes. Such fortifications, etc., must be held for military purposes only, otherwise they will revert to the British Government. Ammunition and small arms and supplies will be given at cost.

Metal Workers to Strike. New York, Sept. 2.—A strike of the sheet metal workers in this district was called Thursday night by the Amalgamated Sheet Metal Workers' Union. About 2,800 members attended the meeting and the call for the strike was almost unanimous. The strike will affect about 200 buildings, which are in course of construction, and about 200 shops, in which the metal workers are employed. The men demand an advance of 60 cents a day.

Committed For Trial. Chatham, Sept. 2.—The preliminary hearing in the case of Robert Miller, charged with stealing cattle from John Cochrane of Ridgetown from the latter's farm at Clearville, was held in the County Court here yesterday morning before Magistrate Houston. The magistrate thought the evidence sufficient to justify him in committing the prisoner for trial.

Boston's Population. Boston, Sept. 2.—The population of Massachusetts is 2,932,953 according to a preliminary report made yesterday by the State Bureau of Statistics. This is an increase of 498,775 over 1895, when the last official census was taken. Boston's population is 532,638, an increase of 96,673 in the past ten years or 19.95 per cent.

Morse Cholera. Danzig, Prussia, Sept. 2.—Seven new cholera cases were reported officially to the Provincial Government yesterday, four in Nakiel on the River Neisse, one at Uch and two at Fordon. Two new cases, one death and three suspected cases were reported at Culm yesterday.

Winnipeg's Building Boom. Winnipeg, Sept. 2.—The nine-million-dollar mark in building permits was passed Thursday, making a greater total than the whole of last year.

Lumber Yard Burned. Quebec, Sept. 2.—Fire completely destroyed Bertrand's lumber yards yesterday morning. The loss is very heavy.

Died at 102. Fort Edward, N. Y., Sept. 2.—At the age of 102 Jacob Howard, a farmer, died Thursday at Greenwich.
