

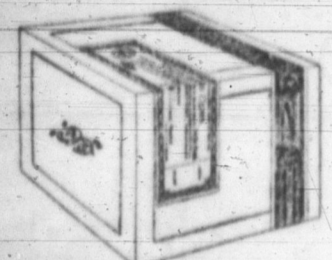
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FIFTY THOUSAND FARM LABORERS

Says Mr. Preston, are Needed in the Older Provinces.

Replying to Secretary Bennett's letter in the English press on the subject of the bringing of immigrants to this country, Mr. Preston declares himself in this way:

The immigration movement requires... The government's publications bear the authority of the nation...

Mr. Bennett's explanation... The great majority of farm laborers... take advantage of opportunities...

Mr. Preston says: "Mr. Kennedy's explanation as to farm laborers giving up their work after harvest and gathering in industrial centres is too ridiculous to discuss."

Fields in their fallow make some poor make of themselves... If Mr. Preston does not know it, and we think he does, it is time for us to tell Mr. Preston that the statement is absolutely and unqualifiedly correct, and no man knows it better than this same gentleman.

Instead of protecting the interests of this country by exposing the frauds who are winking the immigration business in the old country, he has, by practically closing his eyes to it, encouraged these robbers. Mr. Preston has made more than one foolish statement in the interest of those who are seeking to flood this country, and his latest one, that the older provinces are in need of 50,000 farm laborers, is nothing short of a deliberate falsehood or a display of ignorance of the needs of this country which unites him to adequately represent Canada in the old land.

It is just such statements as these which encourage men from good positions in the old land and bring them very often to the verge of starvation in this land.

Apart from this, and inasmuch as this Mr. Preston, whose uncle swore in a court of law that he would not believe him under oath, has not been long enough in Canada at any time since his appointment as an immigration agent, he does not receive because of his fitness for the duties incidental to the office to become seized of what demand, if any, there was or is for farm or any other labor in the Dominion. No, his time, when visiting Canada, is busily occupied in defending his own official self from the attacks of those who knew him longest and best and in quite another sphere.

Canada and its workmen have no greater enemy in the old country today than this gentleman of rash statements, and those of the government, in its own interests, and those of the country, should recall him.
