THE HALF-HOLIDAY.

**Clerks Will Hold a Meeting Next
Week—Hardware and Boot and
Shoe Men Agree.**

Next week the clerks of the different dry goods, hardware, boot and shoe and other establishments intend holding a meeting in reference to the half-holiday movement. Among the clerks there is still a strong hope that their efforts to bring about a weekly half-holiday will eventually meet with entire success.

Some of the clerks maintain that the outlook at present for the half-holiday this summer is even brighter than it was this time last year. They state that only a few merchants seem disposed to offer any objection, and it is believed that these in time will come over to the majority.

The hardware clerks have been privileged with a weekly half-holiday during the summer months for the past three years. They are, in fact, the pioneers in the movement. The benefits they have accurately and so acknowledged by the hardware employers themselves, who have come to lend a hearty co-operation in the movement.

As an evidence of the support which the hardware clerks are receiving from their employers, it might be mentioned that a leading merchant has interested himself in behalf of the movement to the extent of personally attempting to bring about an extension of the time during which the half-holiday obtain.

He desires that the half-holiday not only be extended in the months of June, July and August, but that it be extended to the month of September as well. He reasons that it is practicable for three months, why not for four. Every hardware merchant, with the exception of one, has acceded to the extension and it is believed that all will lend their concurrence before the summer.

Most of the boot and shoe merchants have agreed to give their clerks the half-holiday this summer.

SWEETHEART WAS TRUE.
Lothario Kennedy Fares Well While in Jail.

William Kennedy is a colored man twenty-seven years of age. He was arrested yesterday afternoon, between two and three o'clock, at the foot of King street by Detective Killen on a warrant charging him with wilfully breaking windows in Mrs. Russell's house in Harrington's Alley. It was only the other day that Kennedy left a deposit of eight dollars for using abusive language to a colored woman in Union Alley. When arrested by the officer yesterday he said, "You are only joking," but the detective informed him he never spoke in a jocular way so Kennedy went into a cell.

This morning Mrs. Russell, whose husband dropped dead a few weeks ago, while working in the electric light station, was in court and told of the incident in which Kennedy was of his conduct there. Kennedy was fined twenty dollars or two months with hard labor.

Kennedy has many admirers among the young colored ladies of the city, although he is understood to be a married man. He and his wife separated some time ago and Kennedy now has a sweetheart who is employed as a domestic with a family on Elliott Row. This lady heard of her friend's trouble and last night, between ten and eleven o'clock arrived at the central station with a sumptuous supper for William.

A HOUSE RAIDED.
Police Arrest Three Inmates of Infamous Resort on Sheffield Street.

Between twelve and one o'clock this morning Sergeant Campbell and Officers Scott and Thomas Sullivan raided the resort on Sheffield street and arrested Sarah Moran, better known as "Buck," Lizzie Wetmore and Amos Kerr. Sarah was charged with keeping a bawdy house and the other two with being inmates of the same. The Wetmore woman, also known as Lizzie Hayes, all were very much under the influence of liquor.

Sarah Moran was the first of the trio called by his honor this morning and pleaded guilty. She was informed that she would be sent to the Home of the Good Shepherd for six months. This was more than her ladyship could stand and as she went out of the door she made several positive observations to the effect that she would not go there if she did she would not stay.

Amos Kerr, who was charged with keeping a bawdy house and the other two with being inmates of the same, was also pleaded guilty and the pair were remanded. Kerr, when arrested had on his person \$15.01.

ANOTHER I. C. R. MAN FIRED.
Friends Say Political Management Says It Was for Other Reasons.

Fred C. Morrison, a checker at the I. C. R. freight shed and a man who has been in the employ of the road for fifteen years past, was notified this morning that his services would not be required in the future.

Morrison went to work as usual and the next morning he was informed that when the foreman told him he was not wanted.

Morrison's friends claim that he was dismissed for political reasons, but the railway people say it was for good and sufficient cause and had nothing to do with politics.
