Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties,—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, deughter, brother or sister.

DESTRUCTION OF SWITCHES TIES UP TRAIN SERVICE

No One Hurt in Train Accident at Canton Junction,

CANTON, Mass., Aug. 28.— Injuries received in a brutal assault made with an axe at midnight Thursday, resulted in the death tonight at the St. John's Hospital of Mrs. Flora Rivers, aged 35 years, and the state police are looking for Henry Ferron, said to be the wondardence division of the New York, New Haven and-Hartford Railroad was tied up for several hours late this afternoon and tonight. No one was hurt in the accident and none of the cars of the passenger train left the rails.

The cause of the wreck is not known. The train, which consisted of the engine, three passenger cars and a smoker, was going at a moderate speed when the engine suddenly jumped the tracks at the junction of the main line and the Stoughton branch and plowed across the tracks, destroying the switches, finally tipping over on its eide. Both the engineer and fireman escaped safely, and beyond a shaking upone of the passengers was hurt. A large wrecking and repair crew was set: at work immediately to repair the damage, but all trains were held up for several hours, and passengers on the local trains had to make their journey by electrics.
