## SIR THOMAS FOR EUROPE

Head of Canadian Pacific Sails from New York — Will Order Two New Ships in Europe.

New York, N. Y., Mar. 8.—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was a passenger today on the steamship Celtic for Liverpool. He stated that the Canadian Pacific contemplated spending about \$34,000,000 in the coming year on improvements and extensions to their line and while in England he expected to place orders for the building of two new ships for the Pacific trade. These steamships will be about 15,000 tons each.

Sir Thomas would not give his views on the matter of reciprocity, but said that he thought the general feeling in Canada was not very favorable to it.

## ICE WALL BLOCKS SYDNEY HARBOR

May be Necessary to Use Dynamite to Open Port to Navigation—Sun Could Not Melt It.

Halifax, Mar. 8.—It may be necessary to use dynamite to open Sydney harbor to navigation. The ice in the harbor is nearly sixteen inches in thickness but the real obstacle is an ice barrier which has formed across the mouth of the harbor and which is now about sixteen feet thick. It is made of lolly ice and snow and effectively keeps all shipping from the port. The dynamiting of this huge mass of ice is now being considered. Sea captains say that it can be removed in no other way. It would take a whole summer's sun to melt it. Very few people have any idea of the quantity and thickness of the ice on the coast. A sea captain told your correspondent that in some places it was sixty feet high, having been placed there upon tier until it reached that great height.

## PULP AND PAPER PROJECT

A new company is being floated by Messrs. Donald Fraser and Son, of Fredericton, to handle the Messrs. Jas. Murchie's Sons Company property in the vicinity of Edmundston, recently purchased for \$242,000, the object being to conduct a pulp manufacturing business with the possibility of eventually branching out into the paper manufacturing business as well. In the Royal Gazette notice is given that application will be made at the present session of the Legislature for an act for the incorporation of Messrs. Fraser, Limited, for the purpose of carrying on a pulp and paper and lumbering business and with all the necessary rights in connection with that business. The capital stock of the company is to be \$250,000, with the right on the approval of two-thirds in value of the shareholders, to increase the capital to \$1,000,000.

## APOLAHU NEWS.

Apohaku, March 7.—The funeral of the late Miss Dora Jones was held from her mother's home this morning at 10 o'clock, and was largely attended by relatives and friends. The services were conducted by Rev. James McLuckie, assisted by Rev. Frank Baird of Sussex. The pall bearers were the five brothers of the deceased, Seth, George B., William A., Herbert S., and Hanley, also her brother-in-law Neil Johnson.

Besides beautiful floral offerings from relatives were offerings from H. W. Cole and Keith Barber, of St. John. After service in the Baptist church interment was made at the Old River Bank cemetery.

## IMPORTANT DISCOVERY

Achievement of a Cure for Infantile Paralysis Expected—Preventative Method Already Discovered.

Albany, N. Y., Mar. 8.—"We have already discovered how to prevent infantile paralysis. The achievement of a cure I may conservatively say is now not far distant provided obstructive measures are not thrown in the paths of men who are working for the solution of this and other great problems." This statement was made by Dr. Simon Fletcher of the Rockefeller institute who, together with other representatives of the state medical society, came to Albany today to appear at a joint hearing before the senate judiciary and the assembly and public health committee in connection with a bill proposing various regulatory measures respecting the practice of animal experimentation.

## ORANGEMEN OPPOSE IT

Grand Black Chapter of Ontario Urge Sir Wilfrid Laurier to Withdraw Reciprocity Proposals.

Barrie, Ont., Mar. 8.—The provincial grand Black Chapter of Ontario West, in annual convention here, telegraphed Sir Wilfrid Laurier urging the withdrawal of the proposed reciprocity agreement as a menace to British connection, and ultimately resulting in separation from the Empire. Lieut. Col. Belcher claimed in his address reciprocity will kill the Imperial preference.

A message was also wired to Belfast sending sympathy with the firm attitude of opposition to the home rule measure evinced by the Ulster loyalists and offering to assist in all lawful defence of British rights.

"The English language is the only one for Canada," is the import of another resolution while a third approves of a monument in Queen's Park, Toronto, to the veterans of 1812 and 1814. A resolution of loyalty to the King and their institutions was passed this morning.

## RECIPROCITY AFFECTS THE GRAIN TRADE

Winnipeg, Man., March 8.—Through the Grain Growers Guide the official organ of that powerful organization of the farmers in western Canada orders were today sent broadcast that all grain of whatever character, is to be withheld from the markets pending the consummation of the reciprocity agreement, as an alleged combine in the United States of grain men propose to put up the price enormously. It looks as if no more grain will be shipped from the three prairie provinces, or from the head of the Canadian lakes till after seeding, as grain growers always follow their orders implicitly.
