GERMAN EMPEROR'S SPEECH FROM THRONE

Peace of Empire Can Only be Maintained by Increased Armaments, He Says—Agreement with France.

Berlin, Feb. 7.—Emperor William in person opened at noon today the thirteenth Reichstag, which has assembled since the foundation of the German Empire. As is customary, instead of going to the imperial parliament, the Emperor called the members to the palace, where he made his speech from the throne in the great white hall.

The deputies present were for the most part in uniform on court dress, and the scene was a brilliant one. After greeting the members of the imperial parliament in the names of the government confederated states of the empire, Emperor William affirmed his desire to augment the welfare of all classes of the people of Germany and maintain the strength and prestige of the nation.

There was some disappointment over the fact that the Emperor's speech for which the members of the Reichstag were waiting with the utmost eagerness in which he made references to the international situation and the expected increase in the army and the navy. The Emperor merely announced the measures in a general way and did not give any details. He said:

"For the success of our work of peace at home and overseas the empire must remain powerful enough to defend at all times its national honor and its possessions as well as its just interests in the world. It is therefore my constant duty and care to maintain and strengthen both on land and sea, the power of the German people, which does not lack young men capable of bearing arms. Measures with this end in view are in preparation. They will be submitted to you together with proposals for covering the additional cost. In helping this important work, gentlemen, you will be greatly serving the fatherland."

In concluding, our agreement with France was the new proof of our readiness to settle international differences amicably, whenever such a course is confident of the dignity and interests of Germany. Side by side with Austria-Hungary and Italy my policy has been steadily directed toward the cultivation of friendly relations with all the powers on the basis of mutual respect and goodwill.

Cheers were raised at the Emperor's referred to the satisfactory state of the imperial finances and to the continuation of the traditional tariff policy of Germany while the applause was particularly great when he proclaimed the necessity for strengthening the army and navy.

As soon as the Emperor had concluded, Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the imperial chancellor, announced the Reichstag was opened. Three cheers for the emperor were then given and the ceremony closed.

"SALT RHEUM" TRYING TO AMEND INTERNATIONAL FUR SEAL AGREEMENT

Washington, Feb. 7.—An attempt to amend the international fur seal agreement so that it will prohibit any killing of seals by Americans on the Pribilof Islands for a period of 15 years, occupied the house today, and Richard Cullen, when that body adjourned tonight.

Chairman Sulzer and the majority of the house committee on foreign affairs are opposed to any change in the treaty, as it was agreed to by the diplomatic representatives of the United States, Great Britain, Russia and Japan. The bill to carry this agreement into effect was brought up for passage today, but a strong movement to insert restrictions upon American seal killing at the Pribilof Islands prevented its passage.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, who has resided in the Dominion of Canada for a period of one year immediately preceding the date of application in person at the Dominion Lands Office or Sub-agency for the district, may by proxy make an application for a quarter section of available land in the Northwest Territories. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Office or Sub-agency for the district, either by proxy made at any agency or Sub-agency for the district, by his or her son, daughter, brother or sister of infirming homesteaders.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homesteaded right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in the district and pay fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

Duties.—Must reside upon the homesteaded or purchased land in each of six years from date of homesteaded or purchased land. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in the district and pay fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that a Bill will be presented for enactment in the next Session of the Provincial Legislature to further amend the "St. John Assessment Act, 1909" and amending Acts.

The objects desired to be attained by this Act are:
 (1) To provide that after the 1st day of January, 1913, the tax on buildings and improvements be reduced fifty per centum and after such date still further reduced from time to time until the tax on such buildings and improvements disappears altogether; also that the land exclusive of buildings shall be assessed at twice the true value to provide for the revenue lost on account of the decrease in the taxation of such buildings and improvements.

(2) To provide that personal property be exempt from taxation as soon as circumstances will permit.

(3) To empower the Common Council of the City of Saint John to appoint a Commission which shall be empowered to purchase land, power to adjust as equitably as possible all difficulties which may arise on account of the Change above mentioned, more particularly with reference to long renewal leases.

(4) To provide that the Five dollar poll tax be reduced to Two dollars.

(5) To repeal Section 1 of the Act of Assesment of 10 Ed. 7, Cap. 64 (1910), which provides that the rate of taxation for the years 1911, 1912, 1913, 1914, 1915 and 1916 shall not exceed the tax rate for the year 1910.
