**RENEWED INTEREST IN FARM PURSUITS**

Continued from page one.

The budget debate was resumed by Mr. Dixon, who was followed by Mr. Tweeddale. Mr. Dixon's speech was quite a departure from those of his predecessors as he dealt with the question of agriculture, more from a professional than a political standpoint.

Referring to the awakening that has taken place regarding agriculture in this province he gave the government credit for having practically doubled the appropriation for agriculture and alluded to the great success which had followed the efforts of the government to interest the farmers in fruit culture. He had nothing to say against the policy of the old government in planting instruction orchards throughout the province, but censured the agricultural department for neglecting the orchards after they were planted. Mr. Dixon expressed the idea that while he did not think the time ripe for the establishment of an agricultural college in the province he thought greater attention should be given to agriculture in the public schools and that capable men should be engaged to interest and instruct the farmers in intensive farming and better methods of agriculture by which more satisfactory results could be obtained.

Touching the question of roads and bridges, Mr. Dixon explained the great improvement that had taken place through the larger expenditure the present government had been able to make through a better collection of the revenue of the province. In closing his speech, he criticized the opposition members rather severely for the stand they had taken on the Valley Railway.

Mr. Tweeddale's speech consisted largely of a review of the course the opposition had taken on the John Valley Railway, and may be regarded as an effort to set himself right before the electors of Victoria county. It was the same old story as before, repeated since the season began. He claimed that the opposition is favorable to the construction of the John Valley Railway and to intercolony operation, but failed to explain why he had moved a resolution in the House within 20 months, nor did he explain his course in accepting Mr. Pugsley's bill for a railway which ended at Centerville. Mr. Tweeddale repeated the wall of the opposition regarding the construction of the whole railway, but added nothing to what he has already said in this connection.

All the members of the House expressed regret at the sudden illness of Mr. Woods, who has been prostrated with typhoid fever, and is now at his home at Wolford.

This evening Premier Fleming left for Montreal to attend to some important private business. Before his departure he had an interview with Norton Griffiths regarding the dock and other improvements at St. John.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer is leading the House.

The House met at three o'clock. Hon. Mr. Grimmer moved that a bill to consolidate the acts respecting municipalities be not read a third time but be referred back to committee of the whole.

Mr. Copp gave notice of enquiry regarding J. S. Mullin's license to solemnize marriage.

Hon. Mr. Fleming presented the petition of Sir William MacKenzie and others in favor of a bill to incorporate the New Brunswick Sales, Ltd.

The House went into committee with Mr. Dickson in the chair, and continued consideration of the bill to consolidate the acts respecting municipalities.

Mr. Baxter moved that provision prohibiting the liquor license be referred or commissioner to act at city and municipal councils be struck out.

The bill was agreed to with amendments.

The House went into committee with Mr. MacLachlan in the chair and agreed to the bill relating to the Maine Central Railroad Company, also the bill to incorporate Providence Driving Co., and to amend the act incorporating the Fredericton and Grand Lake Coal and Railway Co. with amendments.

Hon. Mr. Fleming moved that the bill to incorporate the New Brunswick Hydro-Electric Co. be referred to committee of the whole today.

The House went into committee with Mr. Spry in the chair and considered the bill to amend the agricultural aid act.

Hon. Mr. Fleming said that the bill should not be added to the consolidated revenue account but should be kept separately.

Hon. Mr. Fleming in reply to Mr. Labllois said that the Federal subsidy would be used to further advance agriculture. A portion of the grant would be expended toward advancing the present position of the Department of Agriculture, while the balance would be used for the action of the Federal government brought \$25,000 more money for the advancement of agriculture. It must be pleasing to the hon. gentleman as well as to the country that the Federal government has realized the paramount importance of farming in a very substantial manner.

Mr. Copp asked if \$25,000 received would be in excess of the provincial appropriation for agriculture.

Hon. Mr. Fleming—Yes.

The bill was agreed to, also the bill to amend the general mining act. After considerable discussion it was decided to report progress on the bill relating to the Tobique River Logging Co., and to incorporate the N. B. Hydro Electric Co.

Mr. Dickson, on order of the day being called, resumed the debate on the budget.

Mr. Dickson's speech will be published in tomorrow's issue of The Standard.

With one of his legs badly fractured below the thigh, Boyd Beattie of Lancaster, was brought to the city last night on the Boston train from Fredericton, where he received the injury.

Beattie, who is a fireman on the C. P. R., went out yesterday afternoon on an engine drawing a freight train. Arriving at Fredericton Junction the engine moved up to the water tank to take on a supply. Beattie, stopped off the engine to the reservoir to lower the sluice when he slipped and fell to the ground. When he was picked up it was found that he had fractured his leg. The doctor at Fredericton Junction was away on a call, but a doctor from Harvey Station came down. A telegram had been sent to Dr. James Christie, who with the ambulance met the patient, who was resting at the hospital where he is recovering as comfortably as possible.
