## CENTENARY WANT TO RETAIN PASTOR

Ask that His Term be Extended or Pulpit Declared Vacant with Him to Act as Supply.

The stationing committee of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Methodist Conference, now in session in Fredericton, devoted practically all its time on Tuesday to consideration of the request from the Centenary church that Dr. Flanders' pastorate be extended another year without seeing their way clear to endorse the request.

The Centenary congregation, which has an exceptional power of devotion to the rule, limiting the term of Methodist pastors to four years in any single charge and that Dr. Flanders be assigned to the church for a fifth year. Failing this the congregation requests that the pulpit be declared vacant and that Dr. Flanders be made available to the church for the pleasure of the chairmen.

The stationing committee, however, were averse to establishing a precedent and in their preliminary draft assigned Dr. Flanders to the Marysville church. This suggestion has not yet been ratified, but the recording secretary of the conference, Mr. Stewart, of Centenary was yesterday notified of the committee's action and in view of the fact that he is the church's pastor.

A meeting of the Quarterly Board was called and the attitude expressed in the previous resolution vehemently reaffirmed. An answer was sent back to the committee that Centenary requested an extension of Dr. Flanders' tenure of the pastorate and failing that that the church be left without a minister when Dr. Flanders could act as supply.

### PROBATE COURT.

Estate of Samuel McClelland.

Estate of Samuel McClelland, late of St. John, tailor. Last will proved whereby the testator gives all his property to George G. Seely, of the Parish of Lancaster, master mariner, and his son, Alexander H. McClelland, now of Newton, Mass., tailors, in trust to sell the same and convert into money and to pay to his wife, Margaret, the sum of \$500; to pay one-quarter of the residue to his daughter Hannah Lulu, wife of John Washburn, of Durkee, in the State of Oregon, farmer; another for the benefit of his son William, of St. John, tailor, to expend the annual sum of \$150 while he lives upon his death, to pay over to his widow, Mary H., and his daughter, Matilda, the remainder of such one-quarter and the remaining one-quarter, the estate consists of property on the west side of the harbor on the corner of Union and Rodney streets, which is assessed at \$2,000. Personal property \$400. The will nominates the said George G. Seely and Alexander H. McClelland, executors, and they are accordingly sworn in as such, probate not to issue until after the usual lapse of fourteen days from the death of the deceased. Baxter & Logan proctors.
