measures which has been long sought by the majority of the medical practitioners of the Dominion now becomes effective by the acceptance of the Canada Medical Amendment Act by all the provinces of Canada. The change in the Medical Act was made in 1911, and was the work of Dr. T. G. Roddick of Montreal. It was favorably received by the medical men of the majority of the provinces of Canada, but met with strong opposition from the West. It passed the House, however, but has only become effective recently, inasmuch as the provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan have not come in until its provisions were approved. The enactment of legislation approved by all the provinces.

The chief effect of the measure will be to enable practitioners of any province who pass the examinations of a central board which is to be created, to become licensed in any other province of Canada. Thus a medical practitioner from New Brunswick, for example, who has passed the examinations is ipso facto enabled to become registered in Nova Scotia or in any other province, and is not required to pass the registration examinations of that province as was required before the present legislation.

With Pass Central Board.

For those who have completed their studies and are not yet registered, it will be now possible to take the examinations of the central board instead of the provincial examinations. The registration as formerly, thus enabling the student to sit for any province of Canada. Thus a New Brunswick is not obliged in future to pass the provincial registration examinations but may take the place examinations. The examinations will be held at central places throughout the Dominion. The provincial board, however, will still continue to exist and those who desire to use the provincial registration examinations as formerly.

According to the act and which is to be known as the Medical Council of the Province of Saskatchewan, the members appointed by the Governor-in-Council, each from a different province, one from each province, one from each university or medical school having an authority to confer degrees, and three representatives of the laity. The term of office is four years.

Owing to the fact that the provinces of Saskatchewan, Alberta, and Manitoba have no university representation on the council an amendment was made by which the Governor-in-Council is authorized to appoint by the Governor-in-Council are to represent these provinces.

It is further provided that one representative from the province have already been named, Dr. W. W. White, of Regina, and one from the University of Fredericton. This province, however, unlike Nova Scotia has no university and therefore no representative is not taught in any of the colleges here in the University of New Brunswick.

Dr. J. A. Macdonald, of Halifax, teaches medicine in its courses and therefore is entitled to represent the province at the first meeting of the council will probably be held in the fall when the preliminary arrangements in connection with the act will be completed.


