MI-CAREME BRINGS A RESPITE TODAY IN LENTEN SEASON

In Many Cities of Catholic Europe, Mardi Gros Carnival Spirit will Prevail.

"Remember that thou art but dust" is the command of the Church of Rome to its followers during the Lenten season, but today a respite is granted from the rigors of the observance to celebrate the fact that the season of penitence and prayer is half accomplished. Mi-Careme is an oasis of joy in the long period of sorrow that begins with Ash Wednesday and culminates with the tragedy of Good Friday and the jubilation of Easter Sunday. In many of the cities of Catholic Europe the Mardi Gros carnival spirit will have a brief revival today, and there will be pageants and processions and merry-making. On this side of the Atlantic Mi-Careme is not generally observed.

Mi-Careme this year is coincident with the observance of St. Joseph's Day, which is the name day of Pope Pius, who was Giuseppe or Joseph Sarto before his elevation to the papal throne. When the health of a Pope will permit, his name day is elaborately observed at the Vatican, with a state visit from the College of Cardinals and a review of the household troops. The festival of St. Joseph, husband of Mary, "Spouse of the

Blessed Virgin and Patron of the Universal Church," is widely remembered by Catholics. St. Joseph is considered the friend and patron of the sick and dying, and he is particularly invoked by Catholics for the grace of a happy death and the spiritual presence of Jesus in the hour of dissolution.

**SPENT HALF CENTURY
ON THE HIGH SEAS**

Commodore Frank Carry Retires from Active Service after Eventful Career—Figured in many Rescues.

Montreal, Mar. 18.—The story of more than half a century's experience as sailor, captain and commodore of the Canadian Pacific Atlantic fleet, was closed today when Commodore Frank Carry, of the Tyrolia, retired from active service. He will return to the little North of England town where he was born.

He has been a sailor since he was 16, and was shipwrecked a year later, when the Spree foundered off Sandy Hook with 500 people on board. It was First Officer Carry who guided the rescue to the Lake Huron.

The Norwegian bark Surrey, which carried a crew of 17 men is also on the list of Captain Carry's rescues.

HEAVY RAIN WEAKENS THE ICE IN RIVER

Last Evening's Storm Made Travel Dangerous—Downpour washes Streets—Thunder and Lightning

The continued rain of last evening accompanied by high winds tended to melt and clear the ice from the lower St. John River, and it is now expected that if mild weather continues today travelling on the ice will be about ended, and a period of isolation will set in for those living on the opposite bank of the river, until the opening of summer finds steamship navigation resumed.

The storm of last evening commenced about six o'clock, when the city was visited with heavy rain accompanied with sharp flashes of lightning. The wind gradually increased, and at nine o'clock last evening there was every indication of an approaching violent storm, so much so, that few residents appeared on the streets, deeming it more advisable to stick to their respective fire sides. Fortunately, however, the wind and lightning ceased and the rain lessened considerably, so that by midnight those who in the early evening gave the latest verbal weather probabilities did not see their predictions come true. The rainfall during the evening put the streets in a bad condition and walking was very unpleasant. Reports from the vicinity of Millidgeville last evening were to the effect that the ice was weakening and it was thought probable that, provided the weather today was mild, it would break up.

While in the immediate vicinity of Millidgeville the ice held firm last evening, or at least did not leave open water, it was reported that along the other shore and in the vicinity of Baywater the rain and mild weather was breaking the ice up.

Early yesterday morning the ice on the river was in good condition for sleighing and quite a number of countrymen crossed to the city to take advantage of the kindness of the weather make, before the ice ran out. The mild weather during the late afternoon, however, softened the ice and last evening some of those who had come over in the morning hesitated to return to their homes. Under present conditions travel is considered unsafe, and undoubtedly this week will see the last of ice travelling this year.

HAS'NT CONSIDERED WIRELESS FOR I.C.R. YET

Acting Minister of Railways Says Government has Considered Matter—Dredge Ger. McKenzie Obsolete.

Ottawa, Mar. 18.—During question hour Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux was told by the Acting Minister of Railways, Hon. J. D. Reid, that the government has not yet considered the question of establishing a wireless telegraph system in connection with the I.C.R.

M. Severyn was told by Dr. Reid that the total amount paid for lands in connection with the construction of the National Transcontinental Railway from Winnipeg to Moncton has been \$2,136,260.

Mr. Kite was told that the Dominion government dredge George McKenzie was to be sold by public tender because of obsolete type of machinery, lack of power, etc.

UNITED STATES STEEL CORPORATION LOST HEAVILY LAST YEAR

New York, Mar. 18.—Aggregate loss of business of the United States Steel Corporation for 1913 was \$786,840,299, an increase of \$61,388,783 over the preceding year, according to the detailed report of the corporation issued today.

Net income for 1913 showed an increase of \$27,477,766 with an increase in surplus net income of \$26,976,936, while the balance of surplus for the year increased \$11,976,936.

SEVEN THOUSAND MORE REBELS ARE BEING ARMED.



Mr. Bryan, Secretary of State, has complained to General Carranza, through Consul Hostetter, of Hermosillo, that an American company operating a sugar plant at Novatis, Sinaloa, had been called upon for forced loans. In reply Mr. Bryan was informed that the concern which made the complaint was not an American concern. Some time ago a conditional sale of the property, valued at several million dollars, was made to American capitalists, but when called upon to comply with the terms of the transaction they failed to do so and the property was taken back by the Mexican owners, who belong to the cientifico party.

The constitutional force in Durango, numbering 7,000, has been ordered organized, and arms and ammunition have been ordered for it.

The constitutionalists have received offers from California of fully armed and equipped vessels with which to attack the west coast ports now held by the federals. The offers are being considered and probably will be accepted.

THE COURTS.
