NEW BRUNSWICK BATTALION COMPLETE

New Brunswick has for the first time in her history raised a battalion of infantry for overseas service. The 28th Battalion is now complete except for some details and a few very few replacements. That result has been attained in four weeks of recruiting under not a few difficulties at the commencement, for it must be repeated that all the work of the battalion has been undertaken before the actual recruiting could be started.

Audacious Soon Ready For Action Is London Report

London, Nov. 21—(Correspondence)—Persistent rumors are in circulation here that the battleship Audacious, which was sunk by a mine off the coast of the north coast of Ireland on October 27, has been salvaged. According to these reports the wrecking vessels of the admiralty succeeded in raising the big gun of the Audacious and afterwards beached her. The ship is said to be in condition for repairs and service after a short time.
