Spartacans Are Beaten

QUIET PARTLY RESTORED.

Copenhagen, Jan. 9.—German troops have occupied all the public buildings in Berlin and thousands of Government troops are still entering the capital.

The Berlin correspondent of the Berlingske Tidende, who sends this information, declares that the Spartacans have been beaten, and that quiet was partly restored to-day.

The failure of the newspapers to appear because of the act of the Spartacans in suppressing them has stimulated an over-production of rumors, contributing to the general feeling of insecurity. The Berlin population to-day is depending upon the telephone for news service and the wires are badly overtaxed. The issuance of a stirring call by the Government for a volunteer army to repress the Polish invasion was a feature of the day.

The civil war fare already is estimated to have cost twenty times as many lives as were sacrificed in the overthrow of the Hohenzollern dynasty sixty days ago.

The conference between the Government and the Executive Committee of the Independent Socialists was resumed this morning, but is believed to be doomed to failure because Dr. Liebknecht and his followers, who comprise the great bulk of the rebels, refuse to deal with the "bloodhounds, Ebert and Scheidemann."

The Spartacan movement is beginning to affect other centres in Germany. In Brunswick the Red Guards and Independent Socialists have adopted a resolution in favor of a Spartacan uprising and seized the newspapers. It is reported that the Spartacans have taken over the Government at Mulheim and Oberhausen, near Essen.

The Berlin Independent Socialist organ, Die Freiheit, to-day throws off the pretence of following the independent leaders like Carl Kaupky, and says: "We summon the revolutionary workmen and the Socialists of Berlin to demonstrate again today their numbers and their decisions."

The paper calls on the revolutionaries to meet in the Siegesallee, where a great mass already has collected.
