IRRIGATION AND FACTS ABOUT IT

What the C. P. R. Intends to do and What is Being Done.

C. M. Richardson of the Canadian Pacific Irrigation Colonization Co. gave the Free Press the following information about the irrigation proposition. Of the 3,000,000 acres, 110,000 are already under irrigation. In the first million section there are nearly 1,000 miles of canals and ditches already made. They tap the Bow river about two miles east of Calgary. It flows into the main canal, which is 17 miles long, 65 feet in width at the bottom and 125 feet at the water line, and 10 feet deep. This canal leads to a natural reservoir created from what is supposed to have been the scene of a prehistoric lake. The reservoir is three miles long, half a mile wide and forty feet deep. The water is supposed to be maintained at a level of 110 feet above the water level of the river. The water is sold to the farmer for 50 cents per annum, compared to \$4 to \$6 in California, and \$8 to \$10 in Arizona. The lowest flow of the Bow river is 30 cubic feet per second. The water allowed for each 150 acres is one cubic foot per second from May 1 to October 1, which equals approximately a rainfall of 15 inches. With the natural rainfall which varies from 11 to 25 inches per annum, the land is completely irrigable. The soil is producing good crops without irrigation, but by its aid they can be increased one-third to three-fold. The C. P. R. will probably expend in the neighborhood of \$6,000,000. There is no single irrigation equal to it in immensity on the American continent.

Mr. Richardson explained that a purchaser could acquire land with varying degrees of irrigability, so farmers could have their choice. He was at Guelph exhibition as well as at Chicago, and declared that the American people were most attentive in their study of the literature that he circulated. He expects many from south of the line next spring.

In case of a fire throw so as to break in or near the flame. If the fire is in such a place as to prevent the bottle from breaking as in wool or cotton, knock off the neck and scatter the contents. The breaking of the bottle liberates a certain amount of gas and the heat of the fire ignites the gas, thus working its own destruction.

Stock Judging Schools

THE two stock judging schools held throughout the Province during previous years, having aroused a desire for fuller information, the Department of Agriculture, assisted by local or associations, has decided to hold more extended schools for the coming year. The schools will be held at Medicine Hat, January 14th to 18th; High River, January 21st to 25th; Innisfail, January 28th to 31st.

Live animals will be brought to the schools for demonstration purposes, and a series of lectures will be given at each meeting. At each meeting there will be full instructions as to the various points of the various breeds. Evening meetings will be held at which lectures on the breeding, feeding and caring for livestock will be given. Special instruction will be given in preparing animals for exhibition and handling them in the show ring.
