**Export Duties on Logs.**

WASHINGTON, May 20.—The Free Press  
Washington special says that President  
Cleveland has been greatly impressed with  
the benefit to the lake coast of the removal of  
the Canadian export duties on logs, and has  
informally directed an expression of his grati-  
fication at the introduction of a bill for that  
purpose in the Dominion Parliament by Sir  
Chas. Tupper, Minister of Finance. There is  
a prospect that this limitation upon the pros-  
perity of a great Michigan industry will be  
removed. The friendly attitude of both the  
American and Canadian administrations to  
this proposition gives hopes of its adoption.
