- "We shall also pay every attention to the other papers men-" tioned by your Excellency.
- The public roads are so essential to the progress of settlement and cultivation in this country, that they must continue for some years to be one great object of our consideration.
- "We shall pay all due attention to the plan which your Excellency has directed to be prepared and laid before us, as the decent accommodation of the General Affembly and the Courts of Judice, are objects exceedingly definable.
- "We hear, with much regret, of the death of His Royal Histories the Duke of Cumberland and fincerely sympathize with their MAJESTIES and all the Royal Family in their great see grief on that melancholy occasion.
- " It gives us much fatisfaction to learn that the vigor and es dispatch with which the necessary preparations for war have been made on the part of Great Britain, have enabled His Majarry to terminate the negotiations with the Court of 55 Spain in fuch a manner as to secure inviolate the national hoof nor, preserve the bleffinge of peace to his people, and avoid the calamities attending a bloody and expensive war.
- "We are happy in returning your Excellency's congratulati-" one on this great event, in which, as British subjects we feel er ourselves deaply interested, convinced that the consequences of war would have been fenfibly felt by the inhabitants of this of province in E's present infant state.
- "The convision impressed on your Excellency's mind of " the just value we place on the constitutional blessings we derive from our birth right, affords us fincere pleasure, and we " shall always derive peculiar satisfaction from every event that " reflects lustre on His Majesty's administration."
