LIVE STOCK MARKETS TORONTO.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards yesterday were 196 cars—3162 cattle, 161 calves, 680 hogs, 728 sheep and 680 horses.

The market for heavy steers was very slow at the stock yards yesterday, at prices from 25c to 50c lower than last week. Medium to light butcher cattle cows bulls, milkers and sp ingers, were steady at prices quoted below. Veal calves were steady, while spring lambs were \$2 per cwt. lower. Hogs went down 25c cwt.

Butchers Cattle—Choice heavy steers, \$9.50 to \$9.75; good heavy steers, \$9.20 to \$9.50.

Steers and Heifers—Choice, \$9.20 to \$9.40; good, \$8.75 to \$9.10; medium \$8.35 to \$8.75; common, \$7.26 to \$8.25.

Cows—Choice, \$7.50 to \$7.85; good, \$7.15 to \$7.40; medium, \$6.25 to \$6.75; common, \$5 to \$6; canners and cutters, \$3.75 to \$4.50.

Bulls—Choice, \$8.25 to \$8.50; good, \$7.25 to \$7.75; medium, \$6.50 to \$7; common, \$5.25 to \$6.

Milkers and Springers—Best, \$70 to \$90; medium, \$60 to \$70.

Stockers, \$6 to \$6.50.

Sheep and Lambs—Spring lambs, choice, 13 to 14c lb.; light, handy sheep 7 to 8c lb.; heavy, fat sheep, 4 to 5c.

Veal Calves, \$10 to 12c lb.

Hogs—E. b., \$10.65; fed and watered \$11.95; weighed off cars, \$11.40.

The labor problem in Lucknow has been a difficult one to solve, and a local livery man has engaged girls to drive commercial travellers over their routes.

Warning is issued by the Dominion Hospital Commission against unauthorized persons collecting money for the alleged assistance of Canadian soldiers blinded in battle.

The labor problem is a very serious one with the farmer just now. A Howick farmer who has been unwell, has a big hay crop ready to cut, and he spent several days last week in search of a man, but could get no help.

The difficulty was settled by the civilian closing up shop and moving the tent away.

The Berlin Limb Factory cannot, it is said, keep pace with the demand for artificial legs, arms and eyes, owing to the addition to the number of disabled soldiers. This is producing a serious impression in the city, where Von Moltke made his famous speech when the Guards left the city that the war would finish at Paris in a few weeks after its commencement. The output of the factory is to be doubled so as to neutralize the effect of the sight in the streets of limbless men.
