WILLIAM GOODERHAM, SR., the founder one of Canada's leading business WILLIAM GOODERHAM, Sk., the louisiness of one of Canada's leading business firms, and for many years one of Torono's most influential citizens, died on Saturday last, at the ripe age of 91 years. Decessed was probably the oldest Mason in Canada, baving been a member of the "mystic tie" for upwards of 70 years.

Hox, Dr. Brouss, Dominion Senator, died at Gitawa on Tuesday. Deceased was a Reformer, and was elevated to the Senate by the Mackenzie Government in 1878. He represented South Grentite in the Dominion Parliament from 1872 until called to the Senate. There are now three vacancies in the Upper House.

But, to the great disappointment of the loyal Palmerstonians, Sir Hector did not appear, he having taken the Toronto, Grey & Bruce line to Owen Sound, and consequently did not pass through Palmerston on his trip westward. Though disappointed, the loyal Palmerstonians resolved to make the best of it, and with that view partook of the repast which had been prepared, and toasted the absent "guest" right loyally. The moral of this little incident is that in future Palmerstonians should be sure of their guest before making ready their feast.

The main objects of the conference will be to devise means of presecuting home and foreign mission work, so as to result in the greatest economy and efficiency; to increase the moral and evangelical power of common Methodism and secure the more speedy conversion of the world.
