Personally, I am willing to talk to anybody in the wide world-always provided, of course, that he won't pick my pockets."

He has therefore established a "flag section" of the Roundabout Club, of which he is the president. Every member of the section is supposed to procure two miniature flags, one English and one foreign, and to wear them in his button-hole. To sport these emblems means that you are willing to talk to your fellow-creatures without an introduction. If at any particular moment you are

too busy for conversation with a casui stranger, all you have to do is to turn your flags down, like an engaged taxicab, and then the world will know that though you are by habit and choice a sociable soul, you are for the time being rung off, as it were.
