In Stricken Ypres—Last Inhabitants are Taken Out

Ypres, Belgium, July 16—The last tenacious inhabitants of Ypres were dragged from their underground refuges and taken by force to places of safety; the cellars themselves had ceased to afford protection from the continual pounding of the German shells. The town to-day looks like an unsharpened imitation of Pompeii; not one of its 12,000 houses is intact and not a dozen of those that remain partly erect are repairable. The ancient pride of Flanders, if it ever rises from its ruins must be entirely rebuilt from the foundations. Of the famous Hall which several weeks ago still showed a semblance of resistance, there remains nothing but a single little tower standing out against the sky like a gigantic finger raised in protest. The only part of the walls remaining is a battered breached remnant on the side of the "Grand Palace." Only here and there is it possible by close inspection to discover any traces of the details of its former architectural beauty.

There were ten thousand people here several weeks ago, and it was still possible to enjoy a cup of tea at the cafe on the "Grand Place," while contemplating the agonizing "Halles"; to-day the only living creatures that remain are two cats sticking to the debris of their homes in the Rue de Thourout. No one knows what they live on and the British soldiers have been unable to capture them.

The dead silence that has fallen here is broken only by the occasional shell that strikes up the ruins, by the German guns firing over the town at Poperinghe, and by the musketry and machine gun fire from the trenches close by to the south. The silence is oppressive toward dusk when the artillery fire becomes desultory.

Protected by the ruins, one may approach so close to the first line as to get a vivid auricular impression of what is going on in the trenches. The "Fang, Fang, Pang" of the rifles with intervals of the "Fang-a-pang-a-pang-a-pang" of the machine guns, more intermittent as night falls, and then comes from the trenches the surprising contrast of the refrain, "It's a long way to Tipperary" with the accompaniment of a piano that the Tommies dug out of the ruins and requisitioned for evening diversion.

The final destruction of Ypres followed the attack with asphyxiating gas. It is the common belief in Belgium that the wiping out of the town was a premeditated revenge for the failure of the effort to occupy it. Shells intended for the British lines or for the batteries in the rear might easily stray into the town, but they say, the aim of the Germans is good enough not to waste in that way the thousands of tons of ammunition required to reduce the place to a stone heap, and the only military importance attached to this is proximity to the battle front. Counting the shots that went wide of any structure, it is estimated that more than a hundred thousand of different calibres were spent on Ypres. Thousands more were expended in the gas attack along the route from Ypres to Furnes by which the allies were expected to send reinforcements. All along the road for a few miles, deep funnel shaped holes, sometimes on one side, sometimes on the other and often full in the centre, still show how seriously the operation was organized. One of them lies directly in front of an enclosed plot of ground covered with field flowers above which the fourteen crosses. Here were buried the remains of a detachment of British troops that were sought out by one of the sixteen inch German shells while resting in an abandoned cottage on the edge of

The eventual restoration of Ypres raises conflicting views, all of which originate from sentiment, for the town had long ago lost all commercial importance. The attachment of the inhabitants to the soil calls for restoration, while the ruins of the ancient town remain enclosed with monumental walls for the world to see in ages to come.

London, July 17.—Canada's onrush to the fighting line as the answer of the Empire's call has left its mark not alone on the German front, but has been felt all over England, and particularly in London.

London girls are being carried off as wives by the dozen by these stalwart sons of the west, who have come from the new world to redress the wrongs of the old.

At one hotel which is just removed from the centre of gaiety in the city, and which has been popular with the men of Canada, who have come to London on leave, fourteen of the waitresses have given up their places during the past six months, and in each case the reason was the same. Each one of these girls married a Canadian.

In the Lyons restaurants which dot the whole city of London, havoc has been caused by the Canadian onrush, and some of these places are running short-handed now as a result.

GOT MOTHER ENTHUSED.

London cannot understand the causes which lead to this remarkable state of affairs—that is, the majority of Londoners cannot; but there is one who has told the writer all about it, and she at least believes she knows. This is Mrs. L. Goddard, who lived with her four daughters in a cosy little flat just off Leicester square. Three of her daughters have married Canadians and the fourth is engaged to another man of that contingent.

Mrs. Goddard told about the quick romances which had culminated in this epidemic of matrimony, while her face was wreathed in smiles.

"I'm sure they will all be happy," she said, "and if I were a younger woman there should be five in the family and not four. You see, they are so different from our men. They are not ashamed to love a girl and to tell her so and they are all gentlemen. I love them all myself, so I know why my daughters love them, and they all have been married with my consent."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to re-land in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
