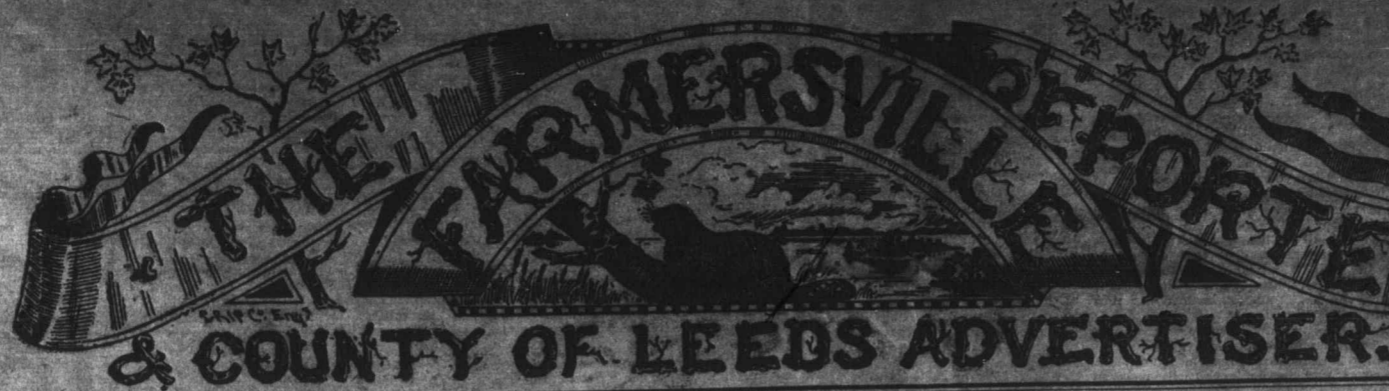

THE CHEESE MARKETS INACTIVE.

Brockville, July 28.—At this market today we had representatives from 25 factories, all anxious to do business. The offerings on the Board were 7,000 boxes, and the outside offerings were carefully estimated at 2,200, making a total of 9,200 boxes of June and July goods. These figures do not include Leggat's combination of 20 factories, that have about 4,000 boxes of cheese on hand, and several other consignors purchasing for the market.
