Harper, who represents some of the largest and strongest fire insurance companies, has published on page 16 a list of the probable losses sustained by his companies, and a statement from head office as to how the payments of these losses will be met. A peculiar feature of these statements is the apparent gloating over the enormity of the loss in each case by each company, a sort of disappointment that it was not larger so they could show the insuring public how easy for them to pay out a million or fraction of a million of dollars without any inconvenience.
