The Wolfville Board of Trade.

The first annual meeting of the Wolfville Board of Trade was held in Temperance Hall on Tuesday evening, November 24th, 1897.

The election of officers for the ensuing term resulted as follows: President—W. H. Chase (re-elected); Vice President—R. O. Davison (re-elected).

At this stage the business was suspended and the Board, at the invitation of the president, repaired to the Royal Hotel where an excellent dinner was provided.

Acadia Dairy Co's Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Acadia Dairy Co., Ltd., was held in Temperance Hall on Monday afternoon, 22nd inst., at 2 o'clock.

A report from the auditors, R. E. Harris and F. A. Dixon, was read, stating that they had not found anything in the books although they had hoped to have them ready for this meeting.

Scott Act at Kentville.

As the result of an attempt to enforce the Scott Act in our sister town of Kentville, the hotel-keepers formed a combine and on Monday last closed their houses to the public.

Kings County Board of Trade.

At the late annual meeting of the Kings County Board of Trade, the president, Mr. P. Innes, made the following address, which we publish by request:

GENTLEMEN,—It affords me much gratification to be able to report to you on this occasion that the general trade of the county has been encouraging and prosperous during the past year.

The imports into the country for the year, on which duties had to be paid, were valued at \$267,305, but this does not by any means represent all the exports or values of the same.

The Nova Scotia apple crop for 1898 may be estimated at 300,000 barrels, of which 250,000 will be exported.

THE POTATO CROP.

Of the potato crop of 1898 the quantity for export will probably be 75,000 barrels. Until recently the price has ruled somewhat low, but it has now advanced to 40 cents a bushel.

EXCESSIVE RAILWAY RATES.

While there has been so much for congratulation I regret to say that, notwithstanding the forcible representations of your board, there has been no amelioration of the excessive freight rates charged by the railway and steamship companies.

CREAM FREIGHT RATES.

The creamship rate from Halifax for the whole season has been roundly 3 shillings per barrel. During the early part of the season the rate from Boston was 1. and 61, and 5 per cent per barrel, which was later advanced to 2. 31. and 2. 61.

A STANDARD BARREL.

There is another matter in connection with the apple business which deserves your attention, and which should not be lost sight of in our discussion with Mr. Fisher, namely the adoption of a standard barrel for the Dominion.
