A brass memorial tablet to the late Miss Alice Dixon has been placed in St. John's church. It is inscribed as follows: "In loving memory of Alice Bessie Geary Dixon, who departed this life March 3rd, 1904 at the Rectory, Wolfville, Nova Scotia, aged 27 years. "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God."

A lecture on the 'Cause and Prevention of Consumption' is to be given in Wolfville on Thursday, August 25th, by Rev. Wm. Moore, D. D., secretary, organizer and lecturer of The Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis. The work of the association is recognized as a most important one, and no person who can possibly do so should fail to hear the lecture.

A very sad drowning accident occurred in Digby Basin last Thursday afternoon, by which eight persons lost their lives. The party were out yachting, and when returning the vessel grounded on Bear Island bar, half a mile from the shore. In their hurry to reach land the party of nine persons, including women and children, boarded the little ten-foot tender and proceeded to row ashore. The little craft swamped with the heavy load and turned bottom up. The only person saved was a man named Vidito, who was rescued after seeing his wife and child drown.

A terribly sad occurrence took place at Windsor last Saturday night, when a young man named Nelson Dill, aged 18 years, was stabbed to the heart and killed, in an altercation with a man named William Haley, a married man aged 37 years, with a wife and four children. The unfortunate boy died a few minutes after the fatal stab. Haley was arrested and has been committed for trial at the next session of the Supreme Court. He had been drinking at the time of the stabbing, and the victim with a number of other boys were annoying him.

Among the many visitors to Wolfville during the month of August are Miss Liva B. James, of New York, a graduate of Vassar and now lady principal of the Frances Skinner academy, Mount Carroll, Ill., affiliated with Chicago University, and her friend, Miss Mary D. Miles, of Mount Carroll, a graduate of the University of Chicago, and supervisor of music in the public schools of Waynesboro, Pa.

Among the many who have been visiting Wolfville during the past week are Mrs. and Miss Huestis, of New York, who are guests at "Evangeline Cottage." These ladies have been in the western part of the province for some weeks, and arrived here on Monday. They express themselves as delighted with the beauties of our town and its surroundings, and evince the greatest interest in all that pertains to the history of the Acadians and the scenes connected therewith.

The death of Mrs. Twining R. Lyons took place at her home at Wolfville on Saturday last, after an illness of two weeks. The deceased, who is deeply mourned, was a sister of Mrs. Hugh Fowler, of this town. The funeral on Sunday was very largely attended.
