

### TEACH ONLY ENGLISH IN THE SCHOOLS OF SASKATCHEWAN

English is to be the language of instruction in Saskatchewan. The first act of the Saskatchewan Legislature after the Christmas vacation was the final reading and passage of the Government amendments to the School

The language clause provides that English shall be the sole language of instruction in the public schools of the province and that no language other than English shall be taught during school hours, except that French may be used as the language of instruction for children up to and including Grade One, but not beyond the first year of a child's attendance at school, and that French may be taught as a subject of study for one hour s day where the board of any district passes a resolution to that effect.
