WILL GET AFTER HIGHER OFFICIALS

T. W. Caldwell, M. P. Disappointed
Potato Warehouse Not Going Up

T. W. Caldwell, M. P. for Carleton Place, who was in the city in connection with the potato warehouse to be erected by the Federal Government on the West Side, held conference yesterday with Commissioner Bullock, J. C. Cheesley, agent of the Marine and Fisheries Department, and R. E. Armstrong, secretary of the Board of Trade. He was disappointed to find that nothing had been done towards erecting a frostproof warehouse and expressed a fear that if it were not erected soon, a large portion of the potato shipments would go through Boston, which port was clamoring for the business.

The hitch appears to be a clause in the lease which the city offers the Government, respecting the wharfage, which is not acceptable to the Government. Mr. Caldwell obtained the local viewpoint of the situation yesterday and he left for Ottawa last night, saying: "Whatever obstacles there are in the way, I am not going to give up until I put it through. The potato shippers need that warehouse and I intend to see that it is erected."

PLEASANT EVENT

AT SUMMERFIELD

On Tuesday evening, Nov. 13, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lunn of Summerfield were surprised by a large number of their friends who gathered in to spend a social hour with them preparatory to their going to Lowell, Mass., for the winter. The visitors had not previously made known their intentions and Mr. and Mrs. Lunn were much surprised and greatly delighted when they arrived. The evening was spent in music and social conversation. A delicious luncheon was served which was much enjoyed by all. Rev. D. R. Chayen, in a pleasing speech referred to the high esteem in which Mr. and Mrs. Lunn were held as members of the community, being much interested in and always ready to aid in supporting every good work. Mr. Lunn in a few words fittingly replied.

After singing "God be with you till we meet again," prayer was offered and the company dispersed, all feeling that they had spent a very pleasant evening.

A crew of 13 men with Allison M. Shaw as foreman, dug 56 holes and put up 48 poles in one day on the main electric power line between Lakeville, Jacksonville and Hartland.

About 100 holes were dug in an average time of seven minutes by the use of dynamite on their section. This crew have put up 17 miles of line. If anyone has a record to surpass this, they would like to be heard from.

APPOINTED COMMITTEES

F. T. Short Here in Interests of New Protestant Orphan's Home—Drive Starts Dec. 10

Yesterday F. T. Short of St. John was here in the interests of the proposed new Protestant Orphanage, had a meeting in the office of M. L. Hayward, and succeeded in naming the committees to look after the matter of raising funds in this district to help along the work. It is a matter of note that with the province having a population of nearly 235,000 Protestants the existing accommodation for the care of the orphans is limited to 153 individuals, while on the other hand the Catholic population of approximately 110,000 has orphan homes sufficient to accommodate 2,000 children.

In view of this the Protestant community should feel it incumbent upon them to provide for at least as great a number of orphans as their Catholic neighbors, whom they outnumber two to one.

The proposed new home is to be built on property left for the purpose by the will of the late James Manchester near St. John and the sum required to complete the buildings is \$250,000, which it is hoped, will be contributed by the people of the province.

A grand drive to raise this amount will be started in December.

Baker will represent the Masonic Fraternity, Rev. L. York, the Knights of Pythias, and E. A. Britton the G. W. Y. A.
