**Boswell's House on the Market**

ACCORDING to the New York Times, the Mansion House of Auchinleck, of which James Boswell was once the Laird, in Ayrshire, Scotland, which he vainly sought to represent in Parliament, is on the market. Here is a chance for some fortunate Boswellian to settle himself congenially, if he be not afraid of income tax and death duties, in Boswell's old home, which he so loved to be away from. It is Burns' county, too, and doubtless still rich in "whisky, soul of quips and cranks," whose unpermitted flow surely the devotees of Jimmy Boswell, one of the most amiable of poets, may be forgiven for deploring. The new American Laird, rich in cars, can travel in them as Jimmy in his youth described himself as travelling "in post chaises, miles without number"; he can eat "of every good dish, especially apple pie"; he can drink "old hock," if any is left in the world. He should have a very fine temper; be "somewhat of a humorist."

"He was pleased to listen," writes Boswell of his Great Bear in 1763, "to a particular account I gave him of my family and its hereditary estate, as to the extent and population of which he asked questions and made calculations, recommending at the same time a liberal kindness to the tenantry, as people over whom the proprietor was placed by Providence. He took delight in hearing my description of the romantic seat of my ancestry, 'I must be there, Sir,' said he, 'and we will live in the old castle; and if there is not room remaining there, as we all know, and the place is described in the 'Tour of the Hebrides.' In his old age Mrs. Boswell asked him to come again. Polite letters passed between them. Yet she cannot have forgotten that 'his irregular hours and uncouth habits, such as turning the candles with their heads downward, when they did not burn bright enough, and letting the wax drop upon the carpet, could not but be disagreeable to a lady,' and 'I have seen many a bear led by a man, but I never before saw a man led by a bear.'"

Boswell loved to talk about the "woods and rocks," the romantic days of his ancestors. In the old days "the Laird of Auchinleck had an elegant house, in front of which he could ride ten miles upon his own territory, upon which he had upward of six hundred people." His own father, Lord Auchinleck, was a strong and disagreeable character, worthy of Stevenson. One loves to think of the cultivated old patriarch, sneering, however, wrongly, at his son and his son's friends. "There's nae hope for Jamie, mon. Jamie's gaen clean gyte (mad). Whose tail do you think he has pinned himself to now, mon? A dominie, mon, an auld dominie; he kepted a schule and can't it an academy." One repeats unashingly all these ancient and beloved Boswelliana and Johnsoniana. They have become ritual. They cannot be repeated too often, especially the old Laird's fine saying to Johnson, who had asked him to tell of what use Cromwell was: "God, Doctor, he gart (made) kings ken they had a lith (joint) in their neck."

Some of us dote on Auchinleck because near it was the place of Miss Blair, Boswell's father wanted him to marry and to whom the volatile young man made love in person and by deputy. Boswell sighed and adored and quarrelled with his "dear infidel." He dressed in green and gold. He even played his part with "Spanish stateliness." He squeezed and kissed "her fine hand while she looked at me with those beautiful black eyes." Does she have any particular liking for him? No. "I like many people as well as you. I like Jeany Maxwell better than you," says the frank lady. Sir Alexander Gilmour is the favorite. Boswell laughs off his disappointment, and writes a ballad:

She told me with a scornful look,  
I was as ugly as a tawney;  
For she a better fish could look,  
The rich and gallant knight, Sir Sawney.

Dear old Boswell, Boswell ever fresh and young! Most un-Scottish of Scotchmen, one of the most mixed of men; unconventional conventionalist; a Tory prop of state and church, who loved to picnic on the coast of Bohemia; amoral, scholar, buffoon, sentimentalist and cynic, generous and sordid; affected and candid, vain and an analyzer of his own vanity; collector of celebrities, sycophant of genius! He wanted a high place at the bar and in politics, and he won immortality by his "quest for London." Most sociable of men, a good fellow, though not without traits of Rousseau. The Mansion House of Auchinleck ought to be a national monument, but money is scarce over on the other side.

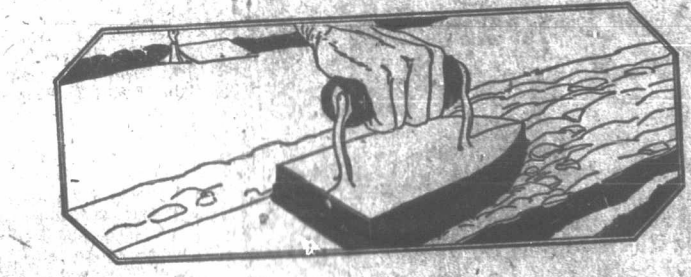

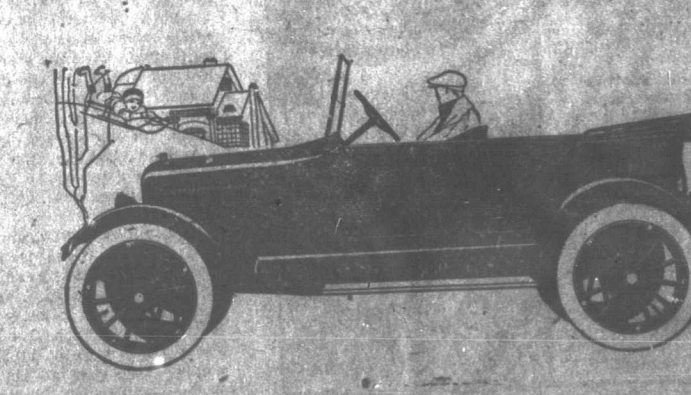


**New Triplex Springs Iron Out the Wrinkles of the Rough Roads**
