LOBSTER PACKING.—The Portland Packing Company are only operating two of their Belvidere factories this year. The factory at Exton's Cove employs 20 hands and has 1,000 traps and the one at Cape Tormentine has 2,500 traps and employs 30 hands. The run of lobsters is said to be better this year than for two or three years past.

CONFIRMATION.—His Lordship the Metropolitan administered the rite of Confirmation "St. Paul's Church on Tuesday evening. Rev. J. Roy Campbell, Rector of Doncaster and Rural Dean, and Rev. D. Bliss, Rector of Westmorland, took part in the ceremony, and several members of Trinity church assisted in the musical part of the service. At the close of the confirmation service, His Lordship delivered a brief but very impressive address to the candidates. His Lordship has long passed the allotted age of man, but his eye is not dim nor his natural force abated.

Moncton.

Civic Government by the "voice" of the people is a relief of the past in Moncton. Civic matters are administered by three "clericals" who operate through their "automatons" at the "Council" Board. As an instance the Mayor asked the board to confirm a resolution appointing David Grant as solicitor for the town in the Scott Act injunction case now before the courts. Councillor McSweeney vigorously denounced the proceedings as an outrage on the taxpayers involving the town in a liability for heavy costs and against the wishes of the taxpayers, and stated that the opinions of two of the best lawyers in the county were that the guarantee of indemnity given by the Temperance Committee was worthless, not as good as no such thing. Mayor McKenzie laid great stress on the moral obligations of these people, but in this enlightened age legal obligations hold more particularly when Civic funds are involved. However the "automatons" voted confirming the action of the Mayor and by the casting vote of the Mayor the Mayor's own action was endorsed and approved. Then for the amusement of the taxpayers the board an annual election is gone through in order to keep up the illusion that the people govern themselves, when they are virtually governed by three irresponsible individuals.

There has been a good demand for fine grades and the market has developed a firmer tone. Medium grades continue slow and unsettled. Daily lots meet with a fair sale at 16 to 18c. but extra prime for extra. Fair to good lots are plentiful at 14 to 15c.
