—A fire occurred in the Queen Hotel, Fredericton, on Friday. The large oil was almost entirely destroyed.
—Mrs. Wiley, with her two children, was passing along a street in Montreal last week, a mass of ice fell from the roof of a house and fractured the heads of the children. One died.

—While the Warford family were crossing from Notre Dame Bay to Little Bay, Newfoundland, on Friday last, a sudden squall captured the ship and all five of the occupants were drowned.

Cumberland Items.

—Col. Lane and Major Miller, of the regulars, Halifax, have been campaigning near here for a short time under command of Joe. Hood, Indian hunter and guide. On Thursday last they shot two moose between the Lake and River Hebert. One a fine buck. They had previously killed a fine caribou.

—There has been considerable uneasiness with miners and residents at the mine, as to the effect the Steel Company would have on mining operations; but at present work is more active than before and there is official assurance that it will be carried on as usual and all contracts filled until the formation of a new company. The body of young Wood, one of those who was thrown in the "Princess Louise," was brought home on Monday. He belonged to a much respected family, and the parents have the sympathy of the community in their sad bereavement.

A very large number were present at the funeral of the late Mr. J. M. McKean. The Rev. Mr. Huggell preached an appropriate sermon, and Rev. McKean and Borden took occasion to impress on those present the solemn thought, that the event was a warning to the only resident of this place lost.

—People in the vicinity at present are in good health. Medical men are complaining.
—Mr. A. W. Jackson is putting a large addition to his fine shop and is making a dwelling of the upper story.

—W. J. Gibson, tin-smith, is doing a good business. He has two men steadily employed besides himself.
—Schr. "Merton," Capt. Brown, from this port, had a narrow escape in the late storm. Ran in Digby at the same time the "Newfield" left the port. He was a passenger.

A prospectus is in course of publication at Parrsboro, looking forward to the construction of a marine railway capable of accommodating ships up to 750 tons.

—Schr. "Lizzie Newton," Capt. Moore, is just leaving for Maitland, Hanis Co., on her way from St. John with freight. Schr. "Island Bell" has just arrived with freight from St. John.

—The Gazette furnishes later particulars of the loss of the schr. "Gram." recorded in last week's Post: On Saturday, at 1 p.m., Hubert Page, of Amherst, Charles Church, of Port Lawrence, and Wm. Mann, of Parrsboro, left Parrsboro to take around to Amherst the schr. "J. E. Graham." On Sunday, there was a heavy fog, and the vessel was driven to the shore by the wind. The vessel was dashed against a rock, the top of which all were fortunate enough to reach by jumping. They then found that only four miles headway had been made since dark. The vessel became a total wreck. She was owned by Mr. J. Edwards. Page was worth \$500, and was uninsured.

FROM AMHERST.
