**Sir Frederick Borden
In Coming Campaign**

**Will be Opposed by Better Thinking People of the
Two Parties—Ignored by His Colleagues, But
Will Doubtless Run Again—Diligently Seeking
Re-Nomination by the Liberals of Kings, N. S.**

Halifax, Sept. 3.—Will Sir Frederick Borden retire from public life before the next Dominion election? is a question often asked by those who are following political matters in this province.

Various answers are given to the query, but nothing definite. The way the political leaders of his party in this province answer the question is pointed out in an editorial in Saturday's Halifax Herald drawing attention to the fact that in the Liberal campaign tour for this province, which begins at Sydney Sept. 2, the name of the minister of militia does not appear in the list of speakers; in fact, he is completely ignored.

In his own county of Kings it is reported that he is hard at work repainting his political fences. Since

the last Dominion contest a new factor has appeared in his riding namely, the formation of a Union Reform League, composed of the best men of both parties. Two years ago the league succeeded in defeating Sir Frederick's lieutenant in Kings, H. H. Wickwire, a member of the local government. His previous majority of over 1,000 was converted into a majority for a reform candidate for the local assembly.

The reform league held a convention a short time ago and nominated Col. Borden's next door neighbor, Mr. Eaton, to oppose him at the coming election. The Conservatives will support Mr. Eaton.

Notwithstanding all this, it seems certain at this time that Sir Frederick will get the Liberal nomination.

**ABDEL AZIZ TO
GIVE UP STRUGGLE**

Paris, Sept. 3.—A morning newspaper prints an interview with Mohammed Sidi El Mokri, Moroccan minister of foreign affairs, in which he declares that after reflection and consultation with his minister, Abdel Aziz has definitely resolved to give up the struggle, although he has not yet decided whether he will relinquish the throne quietly or formally abdicate. The present question of Abdel Aziz is to make a two or three year's pilgrimage to the Holy Land, after which he will return to Morocco. He wishes to be allowed to reside at either Fez, Morocco City or Mequinez.

**BRITISH COLUMBIA
AND SOLID SEVEN**

There Can Be Absolutely No Question—A Solid Conservative Contingent for Ottawa.

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 2.—Addressing a public meeting here the other night, Premier McBride opened up—"A SOLID CONSERVATIVE SEVEN." "We shall have a big majority cast for the Conservative party, under the splendid leadership of Mr. R. L. Borden." At this the gathering cheered loud and long.

Mr. McBride added—"Further, speaking for the province of British Columbia, I do not for a moment hesitate to make the statement that if we have two months for our discussions before the electorate of the great issues, which are at present time before the country, and if the elections are held throughout the province upon the same day there can absolutely be no question but that we will send down to Ottawa a solid Conservative seven." Renewed cheers.

The rate of discount of the Bank remained unchanged today at 2½ per cent.

**WHAT THE MARINE
ENQUIRY IS FOR**

Montreal, Sept. 2.—At the resumption of the marine enquiry, Judge Cassels reminded the government's attorney, C. H. Watson, K. C., that the purpose of the enquiry was not to decide the value of the investigation commissioner's verdict, but to ascertain whether there were any dishonest dealings between merchants and the Marine Department. Secretary Robb and Andrew, of the Shipping Federation and Allan Line respectively, stated that expenditures connected with the improvements of the St. Lawrence navigation were justified by results. Robb got so enthusiastic at one point that Judge Cassels reminded him he was not on Hastings street, Cowie Harbor. The river engineer said the service given was thoroughly satisfactory considering the expenditures.

FIELDING GOES TO N. S.

St. John, Sept. 3.—Hon. W. S. Fielding passed through at noon today for Halifax. He said he knew of no date for the elections, and that the newspapers had been doing all the figuring.
