The Refinery is fitted up to turn out about 600 barrels of sugar per day, but the plant now being prepared is adapted to about one half this amount.

Other buildings will shortly be erected, such as a barrel factory, and warehouses for storing raw sugars.

Toronto, Aug. 20.—The *Mail* contains the following special cablegram from London, Aug. 19.—The arrangements for the proposed international construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway out of the lands of the North West are progressing very satisfactorily. It is almost unnecessary to say that the settlement of the details is a task involving the co-operation of the British capitalists and the Canadian capitalists are working together most harmoniously and the final and complete arrangements will probably be made within a few days. At this juncture it is not possible to be manifestly imprudent, to disclose the details of the terms, but it is safe to say Canadian interests will not suffer in the Premier's hands, and that the members of the Syndicate are acting liberally.
