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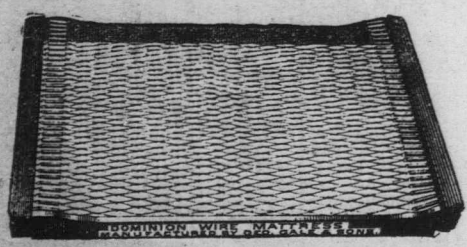

A grave responsibility rests upon this Council. The law says the Council may appoint an Inspector, and the responsibility is on the Council, whose duty it should be to see that the law is enforced.

Another point. When the law was brought into force I am informed that every respectable liquor seller went out of the trade, being honorable and respectable men, but as the Act was being violated all along the line they also resumed. Let this Council put the law in motion and appoint an Inspector, and if this step was taken there was every probability these men would again retire from a business which was being carried on illegally against the wishes of the inhabitants, and also for the sake of a determined effort was to be made to enforce it.

Another grave point was—appoint the right man—a man who would faithfully perform his duty. The Act had been made a success in other places and why not here. In parts of P. E. I. the traffic had been practically stopped by the efforts of the Inspector, Mr. Caldwell, who was known by many in this vicinity, while in Charlottetown under the pressure of public opinion the traffic had been closed up. The result was that large sums of money as fines had been brought into the treasury.

He left this matter in the hands of this honorable Council, and thought they would make such an appointment as would result in the law being enforced.

And if an honest man was appointed, a man who would not take a bribe, or be otherwise induced to neglect to perform his duty, and then if he came to any man from the use of liquor illegally obtained, then this Council would be able, like the Israelites of old when any one was found slain and it was not known who had slain him, the elders washed their hands and said our hands are clean, so may this Council be able to wash their hands of the responsibility and say our hands are clean. (Applause.)

To the Warden and Councilors of the County of Northumberland.

JANUARY SESSION CONVENTION, 1887.

The Council appointed to take into consideration the Highway Act passed at the last session of the Local Legislature in order to take such steps as may be necessary for its application to the Highway of this County, beg to report that they have attended to that duty and recommend:

1. That the Council divide each Parish in this Highway into divisions in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act.

2. That the Assessors, Commissioners and Surveyors of Highways with all the necessary equipment be instructed to proceed to bring the said Act into efficient operation in the several Parishes of the County; and also to procure from the government 200 copies of the said Highway Act for distribution to the said officers.

On motion received and adopted. Council adjourned until 5.30 for Committee work.

At 5.30 Council adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow morning.

THURSDAY MORNING, Jan. 20th.

Council called to order, the warden in the Chair. Minutes of yesterday's session read and on motion approved.

Coun. Tozer moved that a committee of three be appointed as a jail committee.

Couns. McKee, Smith, and the High Sheriff were appointed.

Coun. Tozer also moved that a committee of five be appointed to fix amounts of County Contingencies. Couns. Fowler, Tozer, Betts, McAlister, Eason were appointed. Coun. Adams suggested that this council divide up the amount for contingency and let each Parish have the statement as to the taxes they actually have to pay, instead of stating the sum in bulk.

Committee on Petitions, to whom was referred the Petitions for appointment of an Inspector. Report as follows.

JANUARY SESSION, 1887.

Your Committee to whom was referred the Petition for the appointment of an Inspector to enforce the Canada Temperance Act, beg to submit the following:

The Town of Blackville, which is one of the different parishes of the County, has 554 names on the petition submitted to us this year, and a number of those submitted to this Council in July last. The names are ratifiers of this County and four of your Committee recommend the prayer of the petition be complied with, the appointment of an Inspector.

On motion received and adopted.

Coun. Adams moved that this Council form itself into a committee of the whole to receive nominations to elect an Inspector. Coun. Ryan objected to making the matter private. Coun. Smith thought there was no occasion for a private committee of the whole. He did not know why it could not be done as we are in session. Coun. McKee argued in favor of resolution; and on being put it was carried, and most of the members of the Council retired to the jury room.

Those remaining were Couns. Woods, Ryan, Jones.

Committee of whole returned to Council Room and by their Chairman, D. G. Smith, presented a report, recommending Mr. Thos. Vye be appointed Inspector.

Report received and adopted.

Coun. Ryan made some remarks in reference to the Scott Act, not certainly in favor of the Act, drawing unfavorable conclusions as to the Act, and he believed the man appointed or any other man could not and would not enforce the law. They had a government inspector appointed years ago, and he drew his salary and drove around the County, no doubt inspecting liquor.

Coun. Smith rose on a point of order as to what Coun. Ryan was arguing, saying that it was inappropriate and was too late to argue the merits of the Scott Act upon the report of the committee.

Report received and adopted, and a resolution submitted appointing Mr. Thos. Vye as Inspector. Coun. Smith moved that the Inspector's duties commence and take effect first of March.

Moved in amendment that it be the first of May. Considerable discussion ensued. Couns. Adams, Eason, Smith, Ryan, McKee, Jones, McAlister, Tozer, Somers, McAlister, Bamford, Robinson, Layman, Cameron, McNaughton.

Coun. Adams said it was optional with him to name the salary and moved that his pay be \$500 to cover all personal expenses. Coun. Jones moved that it be \$300, to cover all personal expenses. It was finally agreed that the Inspector's salary be \$400 by the following vote.

Yea—McAlister, Nelson, Sullivan, Underhill, Betts, Hache, Smith, McKee, Wood, Anderson, Bamford, Fowlie, Nays—Ryan, Jones, Tozer, Somers, McAlister, Bamford, Robinson, Layman, Cameron, McNaughton.

Coun. Betts presented the following resolution—

Northumberland County Council, January session, 1887.

Resolved, that the Parish of Derby be divided into the following Highway divisions as required by the recent Highway Act as follows:

Lower District to extend from Wilson's Point to Fitzgerald's upper line, Middle District to extend from said line upwards to Edward Murphy's upper line, Upper District to extend from said line to parish line.

Carried.

WEDNESDAY, JAN. 26, 1887.

Northumberland Municipal Council.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, 19th.

Council called to order, Warden in the Chair. Minutes of yesterday's proceedings read and on motion approved.

The Secy-Treas. brought up the new Highway Act passed last session in the Provincial Legislature, and which altered the divisions into districts, to which he wished to call the attention of the Council.

After some discussion the matter was on motion referred to a committee of three—the Secy-Treas. being one of the three—to look into the matter and make such recommendations to the Council as may be necessary. A committee consisting of Couns. Adams, Tozer and the Secy-Treas. was appointed.

On motion Council adjourned until 12.30 for committee work.

At 12.30 the Council was called to order and adjourned until 2 o'clock.

AFTERNOON.

Council called to order, the Warden in the Chair. Coun. Ryan asked, he having been requested to do so, that Coun. Bransfield be excused as he was sick. On motion he was excused.

Coun. Adams said that as the business appointed for 2 o'clock was the reception of the Scott Act Petitions in reference to the appointment of an Inspector, that matter should now be taken up.

Coun. Smith moved that the new petition be received and together with those presented in July be referred to the Committee on Petitions.

Coun. Adams asked whether the Chairman on Petitions could state when their report would be read. Coun. Tozer, Chairman of Committee, said he would be able to report at 10 to-morrow. On motion resolved that this business be taken up at 10 o'clock to-morrow.

Coun. Smith asked for leave of absence until to-morrow morning. On motion request granted.

Coun. Betts said it was the wish of many members of the Council that the Rev. Mr. McKay be heard on the Petitions for the appointment of an Inspector, and a motion was passed that Rev. Mr. McKay be heard.

Mr. McKay said he appeared here today as an advocate of the cause of temperance. An advocate always with him for two things, a good cause and an attentive and intelligent audience, and he had, he was glad to say, these two things. The question was whether the Act should be enforced in this County. It was generally characteristic of the British subject that he was a law abiding citizen; and nothing but public demoralization would result if this law was with impunity violated, so it would be with others, and the tendency certainly was that when they could with impunity violate one law they would endeavor to violate others.

Under
