New Bridge at Cairo. New Bridge at Carro.

The Island of Rodah, in the Nile, where tradition says Moses was found in the bulrushes, has just been connected with Cairo by the largest bridge ever built over the Nile in that section. The Rodah bridge, which took three years to build, is 1,740 feet long and 65 feet broad. There are fourteen spans, be-

There are fourteen spans, besides a turning span of 209 feet, which is swung by an electric motor, and which when opened gives a clear 70 feet on either side for the passage of vessels. At a recent official test every square yard of the bridge was subjected to a weight of 400 pounds. In order to give this weight the footpaths were piled with sand, while twenty tram cars loaded with cement, twenty-four water carts filled with sand and eight traction engines were kept on the bridge a whole day. The deflection of cach span was noted, and after that the whole of the huge traffic was driven at full speed across the bridge—From Zion's Herald.
